FROM BUENA VISTA

Mrs. Grace E. Hall Milner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Hall, was born in Buena Vista, Oregon, April 1, 1883. She died at Raymond, Washington, on August 16, 1912, after a brief illness of jaundice and complicated diseases; aged 29 years, 4 months and 16 days.

On December the 16th, 1903, Miss Hall was married to Moses E. Milner in Oregon City, Oregon. To this union were born three children, two of whom survive her; they are: Gladys Embree and Francis Mae. Besides her husband and children Mrs. Milner is survived by her mother, Mrs. R. P. Hall, one brother, Rupert C. Hall, and one sister, Miss Nettie Hall. Besides these near ones there are other relatives and a host of friends who are rendered sad over her decease.

Mrs. Milner was converted in Buena Vista in 1908. She united with the Methodist Episcopal church in this place in 1909 under the ministry of the writer of this sketch. She still remained a member of this church. Not only was she a member of the church; she was a Christian. In her last hours she was conscious to the last minute and constantly expressed herself as being fully prepared to meet her God. She said that although she was sad to leave her loved ones and friends, she felt perfectly reconciled to submission to God's will. What a blessed thought it must be to her friends to hear such testimony from her latest breath; what an incentive to them to live so that they may meet her in that

land beyond the vale where tears and sighs are no more.

We are sorry to lose her from our midst and we cannot see nor understand the philosophy of life that will explain her being taken away in the prime of life, but we know that "God doeth all things well," and that "all things work together for good to them that love God."

The funeral was held at the home of her mother, Mrs. R. P. Hall, at Buena Vista, August 19, conducted by Rev. H. G. McCain, pastor of the Methodist church. Burial was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Buena Vista.

Seven Commandments of Alfalfa Growing.

Thou shalt not sow alfalfa seed on wet or undrained land.

Thou shalt not sow alfalfa seed on acid or sour land, but shalt apply calcium in the rock form of lime, or ground limestone rock.

Thou shalt supply alfalfa land with an abundance of stable manure.

Thou shalt thoroughly prepare the alfalfa seed bed.

Thou shalt sow only good alfalfa seed, free from noxious weeds.

Thou shalt inoculate the soil if thou

wouldst reap the best benefits from the alfalfa crop.

Thou shalt not sow in late fall, if thou wouldst obtain a creditable stand.

SCHOOL EXHIBIT AT STATE FAIR SEPTEMBER 2 to 7, 1912

In order that all children may more fully understand the conditions for making exhibits at the State Fair, Superintendent Seymour will meet the children of the county at the following school houses on the hour and dates mentioned. Every child who makes an exhibit will receive a ticket admitting him or her to the fair for any one day of the fair. It costs nothing to make the exhibit, transportation will be free by the Railroads and Superintendent Seymour will be present to look after the exhibits of the children from Polk county. Many of the prizes are valuable and well worth winning; and it is well worth the effort of every child to make an exhibit at the State Fair. Polk County is the banner school county in the state and now is the time for every child, parent and person interested in the schools of the county to help in this fair and see that Polk is well represented.
