MORE LIGHT AND LOVE

If we look around in the world with a view to discover what is the cause of the sad deficiency of energy often put forth in the best of causes, we may find that it arises generally from some sort of narrowness. A man will not help you in this or that noble undertaking simply because he has no interest in it. Not a few persons are a sort of human lobsters; they live in a hard shell formed out of professional, ecclesiastical, political or classed crust, and cautiously creep their way within certain beaten bounds, beyond which they have no desire.

The meagre and unexpansive life of such persons, teaches us that to attain a wider and richer range of social vitality we need more light and more love for one another.

Besides light and love there are three great elements of material progress; and they comprehend the entire circle of human enterprise in this vicinity—agriculture, commerce, and manufactures. They assure to us an increase in prosperity and population that will surely surpass the most extreme expectations of the optimistic. To discourage the further development of these means to hamper our own interests.

To those who may be disposed to doubt the future progress of our city and its tributary country according to the ratio assured, a few familiar considerations in respect to our resources, both developed and undeveloped, could be pointed to with advantage.

THE UNANIMITY OF IT

The most gratifying feature of the mill subscription is the unanimity in which the people of Independence responded to this public enterprise.

The demand was comparatively large, but the citizens are meeting it loyally. An inspection of the subscription list, reveals the noteworthy fact that there are few persons in this city from whom the public had a right to expect large subscriptions, whose

names will not be found thereon. And before the time limit has expired the list may be absolutely unanimous.

We doubt whether other towns in Oregon—or anywhere else for that matter—can show a record of liberality and public spirit equalling Independence.

The subscription list is a roll of honor. It will be referred to in print, and otherwise, again and again. Independence may well congratulate herself upon the size of this roll of honor, and the unanimity with which her people added their names to it. In union there is strength.

LOOKS GOOD TO THEM

Taking the registration book in the county as a criterion by which to base opinion regarding the result of the election next Tuesday, the republican candidates are going to have a walk-away at the rate of more than two to one.

According to the registration there are 3,397 voters in the county. 2,922 republicans, 995 democrats, 93 prohibitionists, 137 socialists, 5 progressive, 129 independent, and 16 none.

While there will doubtless be some deviation from the figures shown above, it is a foregoing conclusion that the republican county candidates will go to office by overwhelming majorities. Since it is shown that the republican registration shows a great majority over all the candidates in other ranks are going to have a rough road to success.

VOTE NO ON IT

The Oregon State Grange and the consolidated German speaking societies of the state have decided to oppose the State Printers' Flat Salary Bill to be decided next Tuesday. Voters of Independence should go to the polls and vote NO on this measure. It is an imposition upon the taxpayers to ask them to buy a state printing office, and pay out unnecessary money which this proposition necessitates if carried.

PARCELS POST.

The Parcels Post Bill passed by the last Congress as its greatest work. It benefits the Oregon merchant and farmer. By it you send 11 pounds on any rural route for 15 cents; 11 pounds on any city route for 15 cents; 11 pounds to any customer within 50 miles for 35 cents; 11 pounds to any customer between 50 and 100 miles of your store or home for 46 cents. But 11 pounds from Chicago and other mail-order cities will cost not less than \$1.32.

Senator Bourne is entitled to the credit for the construction and authorship of this bill, which goes into effect January 1, 1913. Had Bourne neglected this bill in April (primary time) it could not have become a law. He stuck to his post regardless of personal danger.

CITIZENSHIP

Bourne has lived in Oregon 34 years. He owns large interests in several counties. He is a strong supporter of the Oregon System, having assisted in its formation. His speech on Popular Government was issued to 2,700,000 readers at his own expense, and he has advertised the state throughout the world.
