The seed requires a uniformly, fine. which is desirable in beet culture. the more quickly the seeds germinate the more certain a good stand, which is the first requirement of a satisfactory crop.

Good seed is the second requirement of a uniform stand. It is impossible to produce the best of crops unless good seed is used. 
