Committees of bankers in 37 Oregon cities and towns have been announced to pass upon applications of candidates for commissions in the United States army at the second training camp for reserve officers at the Presidio, San Francisco, beginning August 27. Applications must be made through local committees, but where there are none such they will be received at the examiner's office, Vancouver barracks, Oregon quota is 130, and the age limits are 21 to 44 years, except that one who has had three years experience as an officer in the national guard or regular army may be of the maximum age of 50 years. July 15th is the time limit for receiving applications which will be confined to 300 in number, and out of these 130 with 13 alternates, will be selected, after examination. The successful candidates for the training camp course will be notified by letter between August 7 to 10th. C. W. Irvine, of the Farmers' State Bank, is chairman, R. R. DeArmand and H. Hirschberg, of the Independence National Bank, are the other local committee.

T. J. Fryer received a letter from his daughter, Mrs. Campbell, dated Brighton, June 13th, which is quite interesting reading. We have been privileged by Mr. Fryer to print several paragraphs in the letter pertaining to the war, which will give our readers some idea of what is transpiring near the English shores. She says that a number of ships have arrived. Night before last the German submarines sunk four ships just off here. Some of them managed to get near shore and will be saved, but last night they sunk fifteen fishing smacks and early in the week they got two large vessels which they managed to tow into Horthampton about two miles from here. We could see them with the glasses. We expect a raid on this place some time. It is supposed to be safe, but when they get so close, that we can see the results of their U-boat campaign, it looks a bit serious. There were three hundred Canadian soldiers killed in that daylight raid on Folkestone, which took place by aeroplanes a couple of weeks ago. I wonder if the U. S. will be as strict about censorship as this country has been. I doubt if they would stand for it so strict there. The Americans coming over have been accorded a great reception. It is a great thing that the Americans have come over to the right side of this war in such unity for there is no question but that she will have to bear the brunt of the war for the next two years, both in men and money, unless something happens to suddenly end it before that time, for Germany can hold on a long time yet, and seems to think she is winning now.

We are a bit worried, the name of Campbell from B. C. appeared in the killed list yesterday. It was not Riga initial, but gave the number exactly the same as his, except a 2, where Riga is 3. We are making inquiries and will be so anxious until we hear. We are getting a permit to use the camera and hope then to be able to get some nice pictures of the sea and front here, then we can get a permit to send some to you. We will do so. Would you be surprised to see me smoking a cigarette when I got home. I haven't started it yet, but I think I am the only woman in England that don't smoke. I never saw anything like it, young and old white hair and none at all, all smoking everywhere on the beach, in the parks, hotels, taxicabs and everywhere, except in church I reckon. You should see the big airship that patrols the coast. It passes along over the sea watching for submarines. It looks like a huge silver cigar and travels very slowly. I will get a picture of it some day. It often goes along just above a big ship protecting it from an attack. I'll tell you, this modern warfare is wonderful. We very often, in fact, nearly every day, hear firing at sea and know that there is a rap somewhere.

Do you have many potatoes in this year. We have them once a week, is all. I wrote Mr. Campbell to send me some sugar from Canada for our tea. We can't buy it here. That seems rather funny, doesn't it.

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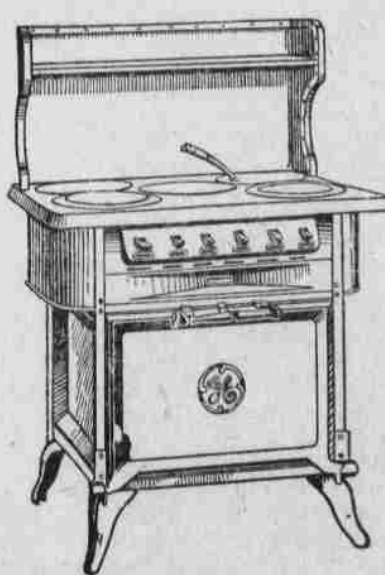
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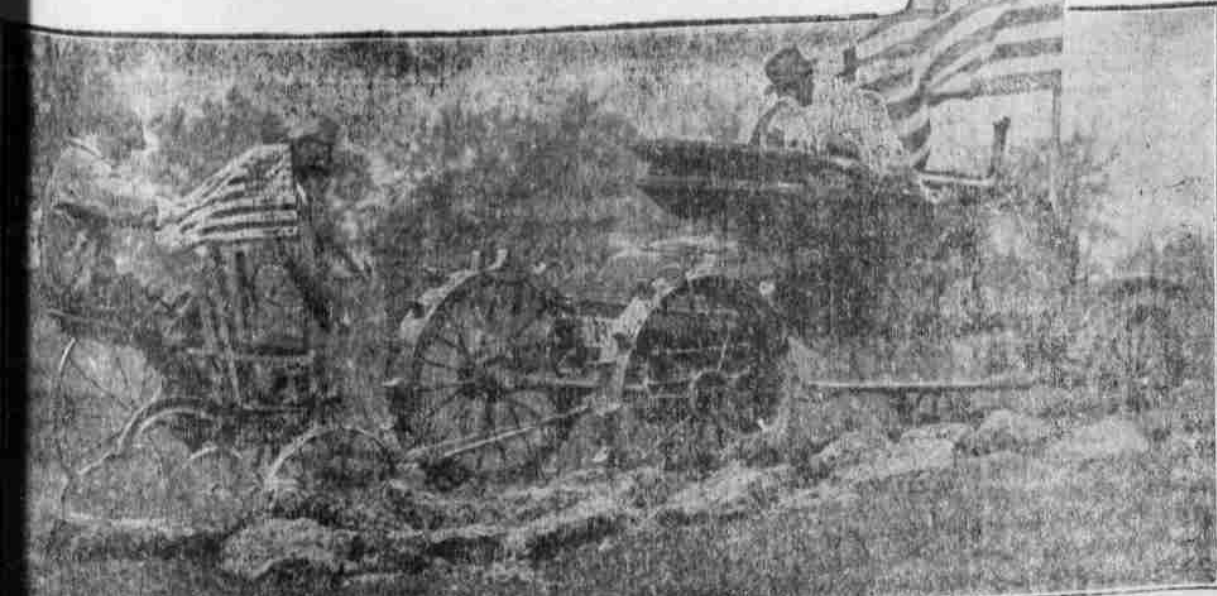
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PATRIOTIC PLOWING



The St. Paul Garden Bureau Encourages Community Gardening

SEVENTY-FIVE Saint Paul families will become soldiers of the soil when as many gardens are planted on the 14-acre plot of land given by a local real estate for the use of home gardens. The plot has been divided into lots of 30 by 60 feet, and each family will plant a variety of vegetables.

The land has never before been under cultivation. Children cleared the land and the city hauled it away.

The land has been made ready for seeding by a Studebaker tractor made by the F. G. Studebaker Manufacturing Company, Saint Paul, Minnesota.

The tractor attachment is brought into a service by removing the back wheels of the Ford automobile and replacing the Ford wheels with the tractor device. While the picture shows three men operating it, the work is generally done by one man and a power plow.

Flags will be put up on the plot and also placards distributed by the Saint Paul Gardening Bureau, reading, "Honor the flag by protecting this garden as a part of the nation's food supply."

This tract will be one of the largest community gardens in Saint Paul. It is estimated that 500 acres of city property never before cultivated are being used for gardens in Saint Paul this year.
