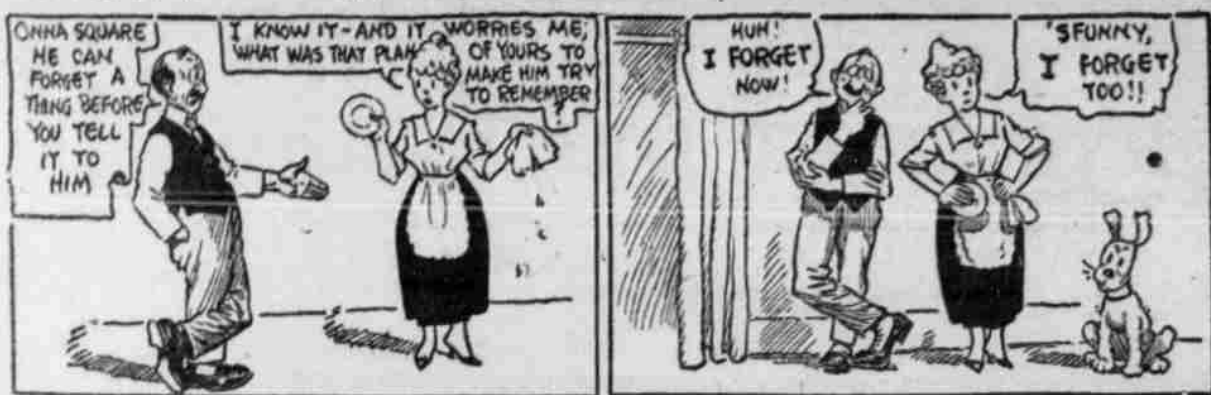




Jasen Byers is confined to his home with a light attack of influenza.

The epidemic of influenza in Dallas which has caused a large number of deaths during the past two weeks, is now on the decline and the local physicians report that very few cases have developed during the past few days. Two deaths occurred in that city and vicinity Monday night from pneumonia, following an illness with influenza. Fred Happy, a farmer living just outside the city in the Pioneer district and Charles Paul a local citizen, being the victims of the disease. Health Officer Dr. B. H. McCallon reports that the epidemic is now making considerable headway in the rural districts of the county which have heretofore been unvisited by the plague. A number of critical cases in the Salt Creek community north of that city, have been reported. A stricter quarantine is being urged by officials in hopes that the malady will be stamped out in a few weeks.

Rice Hastings, well known to many Enterprise readers and at one time a resident here, died at his home in Ashland last week and the body was brought to this city for burial last Wednesday and interred at the Monmouth cemetery. He had a number of relatives in this city among whom being a brother, Reuben Hastings of Pelee, and sister-in-laws Mrs. Heath and Mrs. Estes of this city. At the time of his death, his wife was very ill with the same malady and was not expected to live.

After the funeral the two sisters of Mrs. Hastings received a message that the wife of the deceased was dangerously ill and the two hastened to her bedside. A short service was held at the Undertaking parlors in the afternoon, Rev. Cook officiating. Burial was beside her husband at the Monmouth cemetery. Her many friends here will be sorry to learn of the sudden passing away of these two estimable people and the surviving relatives have the sincere sympathy of all.

EDWARD COCKLE DIES

Edward Cockle was born Aug. 14, 1875, at Manhattan, Will Co., Illinois, when a small boy he came to Independence, Oregon, where he made his home until 22 years of age when he came to Washington and homesteaded nine miles west of Harrington, where he still farms. He was the son of William and Eliza Cockle, his mother dying when he was small. He was united in marriage Sept. 18, 1905 to Edna M. Sherwood who still remains to mourn his loss. To this union three children were born one son and two daughters, Dallas M., Hazel E. and Sula M. He leaves an aged father and two brothers, Walter Cockle of Mansfield, Washington, and William of Independence, Oregon. His father still resides at the family home at Independence, Oregon. He died December 5th of Apoplexy at his home in Harrington being sick only four hours. At the time of his death he was 42 years, 3 months and 20 days. The funeral services were held privately at the home Sunday afternoon and the body laid to rest in the Harrington cemetery.—Harrington Herald.
