Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Smith are in Portland this week making friends a few days visit.

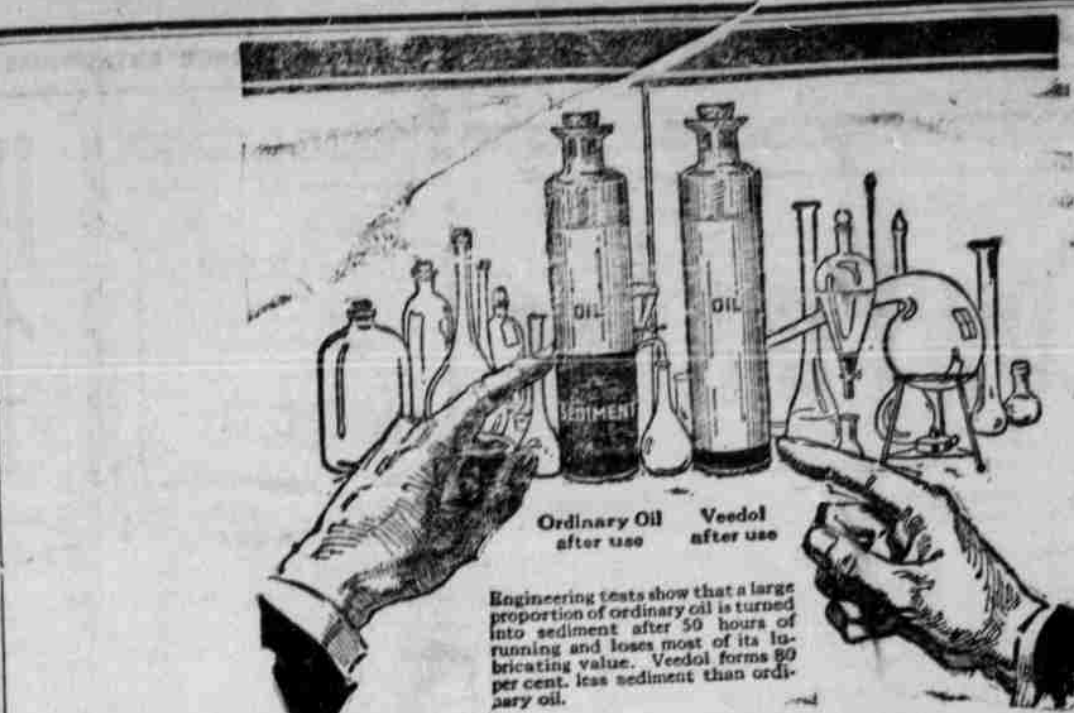
Do you hear any one say "why to be sure we're going to get a cannery" Or was it another pipe dream? Gosh, we were in hopes that something would surely materialize this time.
