## School Notes

The Independence Training School enjoyed a unique Valentine party last Friday afternoon. A feature which was much appreciated was the pop corn balls which were served at the close of the entertainment.

On Friday Mr. Gentle made a trip to Salem in his capacity of Chairman of the Faculty's Committee to confer with Superintendent Churchill, chairman of the Regent's Committee on Courses. The conference had to do with the certification of graduates of the new special courses recently authorized at the Normal.

As a result of the above conference the Superintendent of Public Instruction announces that he will grant special certificates to those completing the special two year course in Drawing, Music, and Physical Training. These certificates entitle the holder to teach these subjects either in elementary or in all high schools and to supervise said subjects in such schools. He also will issue to graduates of the special two year course

in Household Economy a certificate to teach that subject in elementary schools and in one, two and three year high schools.

All the above certificates are issued on graduation for a period of one year. After six months of successful teaching and upon recommendation of the county superintendent a five year certificate is issued. After thirty months of successful teaching and upon recommendation of the county superintendent a life certificate will be issued.

Miss Todd, Dean of Women, and Miss Merwin, State Librarian, have returned this week from a most delightful visit to the Orient. They left San Francisco in October for Japan where they made a leisurely trip across the country by land, thence to various points of interest in China. After some time in the Philippines and at various Asiatic ports they returned through Japan, taking the "Inland Sea" trip on the return journey and reached Oregon via San Francisco on Sunday, February 15th.

### COL. HOFER FILES SUIT AGAINST DOG TAX LICENSE

E. Hofer, of Salem, through his attorneys filed suit in the Circuit court of Marion county last week to test the validity of the state dog license law, enacted by the state legislature in 1919. District Attorney Max Gehlar, Sheriff W. I. Needham, County Clerk U. G. Boyer, Chief of Police Welsh and constable Walter De Long are named as defendants.

By the allegations of the suit it is charged that the defendants are without authority of any kind in the premises for the reason that the act of the legislature under which they assume to act is unconstitutional.

In connection with the filing of the suit all issuing of dog licenses ceased last week in the offices of the county clerk.

Col. Hofer, who brought the suit, owns a bull terrier and in his complaint he asks that the defendants be restrained from collecting the license fee required by the state law. A perpetual injunction is also sought in the suit.

### 1868 OREGON SOLDIERS WERE KILLED IN ACTION

The official revised summary of casualties by states issued by the adjutant general show the following for Oregon:

Killed in action, 1868; of whom 61 were officers; died from wounds, 79; including 5 officers; died of disease, 161, including 3 officers; died from accident, 15, including 3 officers, drowned, 4; committed suicide 3; executed by order of courtmartial 1; other known cases 35; cause undetermined, 18; presumed dead 5, including 29 officers; taken prisoner 11, including 2 officers, all reported except 1 man, who died; wounded slightly, 459; severely, 407; undetermined, 188; total wounded, 1054, including 63 officers; missing in action, none.
