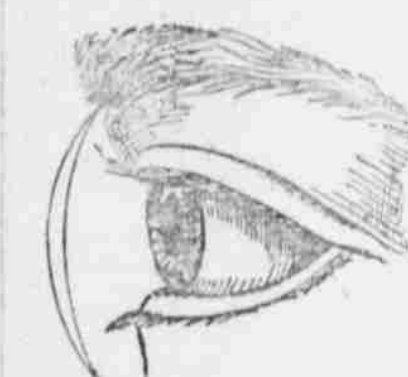
Clifford Wells of Portland, and Miss Alma Wells of Salem, were over Sunday visitors with home folks.

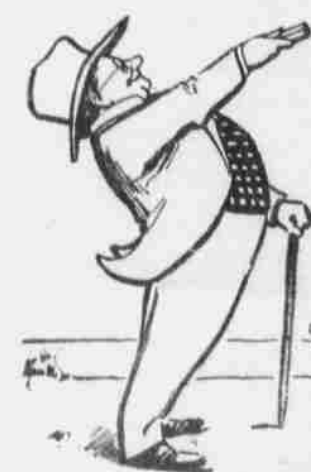

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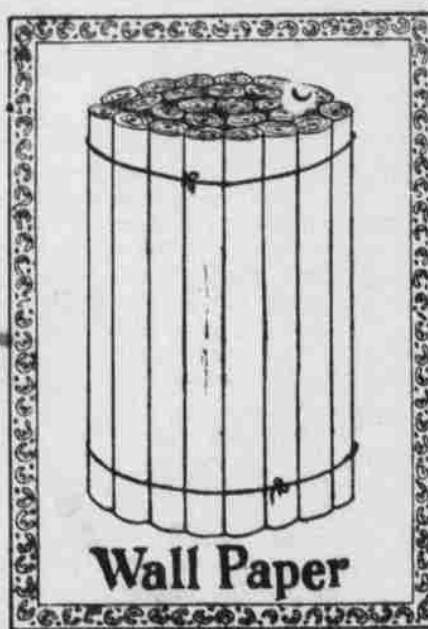
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
