Oregon City grower ships 410,000 strawberry plants to California. Portland capitalists buy and will operate potash plant at Los Angeles. Portland Elks' lodge adopts plans for \$600,000 building on new site. Roseburg—75 acres to be planted to prunes and berries near here. Eugene—Great demand for students to work on farms in Lane Co. Salem, Oregon Growers' Association to construct and equip fruit pressing plants aggregating expenditure of over \$100,000. The Dalles—Cherry growers in this district sign contracts at 15 cents. Union—Construction of \$75,000 hotel under way. Bend—Shevlin-Hixon Lumber Co. gives employees free life insurance. New power line to be constructed from Albany to Corvallis next month. Work on railroad bridge across Willamette river at Albany resumed. McMinnville farmers' telephone system asks for higher rates. Vale—Larger street lamps installed in business district. Portland to get more factories as wool center. Pendleton—880 acre wheat ranch sells for \$25,000. Prineville—Auto camp ground assured. Echo awards contract for new water mains. Channel being deepened from St. Helens mill to Nigger Creek bar. Chevrolet company to build in Portland. Florence—Another logging camp soon to start. Umapine looks forward to bumper crops. St. Helens—City water system receiving \$12,000 improvements. Newberg has cannery doing over \$1,000,000 business a year; sawmill employing 150 men; contemplates \$250,000 paving. Enterprise lets \$62,000 contract for extension of city water system. Klamath Falls—\$36,000 site for new school purchased. Enterprise—\$208,628 paving contract let. Klamath Falls to have new store building and several new houses. Albany—Contract let for \$11,000 store building.
