Early Booksellers.

The first bookseller's catalogue in English language, so far as is known, is one bearing a date of 323 ago. It was issued by Andrew Wood of Lotherbury, England, and was an elaborate dedication to Elizabeth. The first booksellers were migratory peddlers, carried their small stock on their backs and thus may more properly be called pioneer book agents.

In the course of time some of the prosperous hawkers of literature set up small stalls or booths and these were known as "stationers." This origin of the word stationer, now applied to dealers in "stationery," which has come to mean writing materials, paper, pens, ink and articles. Booksellers in England were for centuries treated as criminals and subjected to many trials, which were not wholly ended until 1758. The booksellers in England and America now have full freedoms, the former date from 1829.
