Hamer Deal, wife and son of Portland, are spending the week with Mrs. Deal's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Addison of our city.

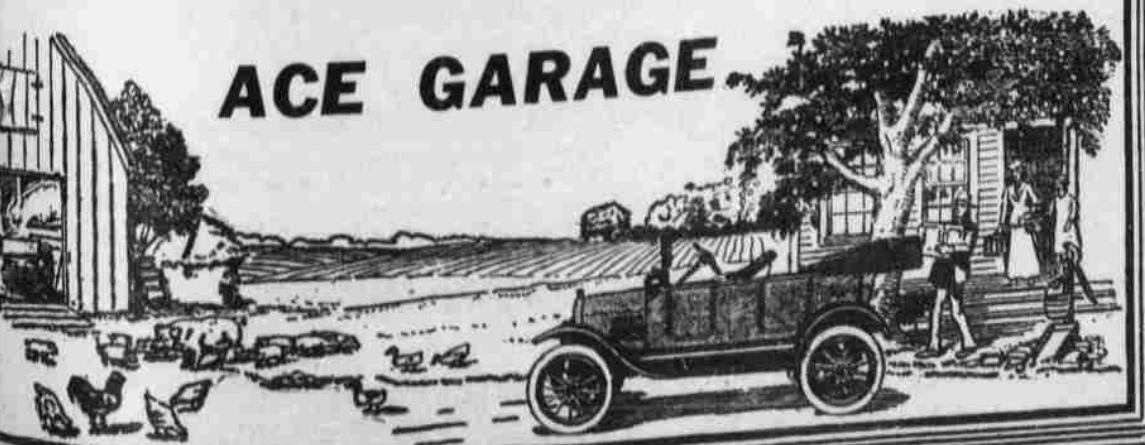
