COOKIES and SMALL CAKES

Cookies

- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 3 eggs
- 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract or
- 1 teaspoon oil of 1 lemon
- 4 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add nutmeg and flavoring; add 2 cups flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.

Cocoa Drop Cakes

- 4 tablespoons shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add well-beaten eggs; add flour, baking powder, salt, cocoa into mixture; mix smooth, add vanilla, 1/2 tablespoon of butter to each greased muffin to bake in moderate oven 20 minutes. Cover with icing.

Orange Cake
4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 cup milk
1 egg
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon orange extract
1/2 teaspoon oil of 1 orange

Cream shortening; add slowly, beating well; add a little at a time; then well-beaten eggs; sift the baking powder and mix together and add to mixture; add flavoring and orange rind; mix well; bake in greased shallow tin, individual cake tins, in oven 15 to 20 minutes. Cool cover with orange icing.
