GOVERNMENT IS DRIVING FOR MORE REVENUE FUNDS.

"In this, as in every other section of the country, there will be conducted during next two months an extensive tax drive for the collection of delinquent sales and other miscellaneous taxes, such as the so-called luxury tax, the soft drink tax, the admission tax, the manufacturer's tax, the tax on jewelry and works of art, and the tax on toilet articles and proprietary medicines. Reports of laxity on the part of dealers and other persons responsible for the return and collection of these taxes have reached the Bureau of Internal Revenue from many sources

"To remedy this condition, a large force of revenue officers will be put in the field and it is expected to result in the collection of millions of dollars in delinquent taxes

"Information from the sales tax unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue is that many dealers in soft drinks and ice cream either are keeping no record of the amount of tax collections from such sales, or that the record is insufficient or incorrect.

"Special attention will be directed to the collection of this tax as well as to the tax on toilet articles and proprietary medicines. Through the failure of retailers to collect in full the tax of 1 cent for each 25 cents

or fraction thereof of the amount for which toilet articles and proprietary medicines are sold, it is estimated the government is losing several million dollars annually. The tax is collected by means of stamps ranging from 1 cent to 40 cents, which the law provides shall be affixed by the dealer and cancelled.

"It is the intention to conduct as thorough and effective a campaign as possible in such a way as to bring to justice willful violators, and cause no embarrassment to merchants and business men who honestly are endeavoring to comply with the revenue laws"

The Enterprise is still \$1.50 a year.

PROGRAM FOR LEGION MEETING

Astoria, Ore.—To make the second annual convention of the American Legion for the department of Oregon the greatest event in the northwest for ex-service men since the war, is the intention of the committee on arrangements which is busily engaged in outlining the program for the important event.

Astoria is the city which secured the honor of entertaining the delegates and their friends and the dates are Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 30, 31 and August 1. Clatsop Post No. 12, which on account of its activity in connection with combating bolshevism has become widely known through the country, has proclaimed that the "buddies" will be entertained as they have "never been entertained before."

The committee on arrangements is as follows: Jesse R. Hinman, chairman; S. A. Wold, secretary, Astoria; Lane Goodell and Arthur Murphy, Portland, Pat Dillan, Seaside; R. H. Hoskins, Leland R. Gilbert, E. T. Gooch, Harry Fuller and F. H. Vincil, Astoria.

According to the present arrangements that are being made, the ex-service men and their friends will gather in Portland on Thursday, July 29th and board a special train that will leave in the afternoon for Astoria. The train will arrive in the convention city about 5 o'clock where the visitors will be received and assigned to quarters. The entertainment features will start the same evening, among which will be a big free dance on the streets, music to be furnished by a 20-piece concert band.

The convention will open on Friday morning with an address by Governor Ben W. Olcott. It is expected that the national commander, Franklin D'Olier, will also be present to address the ex-service men. The largest place in the city, the Astoria Theatre, has been secured in which to hold the convention. One of the entertainment features of the three days' gathering will be the big salmon barbecue and arrangements are being made to seat at least 1,000 ex-service men at one mess table. E. T. Gooch, chairman of the committee having this affair in charge, has adopted the slogan: "Hit that old mess line, Buddy," and will blow mess call and the long line of American Legion members will wind through the streets to the scene of the banquet.

Friday evening, July 30, has been set aside for the annual American Legion convention ball, which promises to be one of the most brilliant affairs of the kind ever staged in the city.

The convention will adjourn long enough on Saturday afternoon for the delegates and visitors to participate in the big historical and patriotic parade. Prizes will be offered for the post in the state having the largest number of members in line in proportion to membership. Many floats and interesting features are planned for the pageant.

Sunday, August 1, will be spent at Seaside where the citizens of that progressive beach resort will serve a clam feed to the delegates and visitors. In the evening will be staged the spectacular pyrotechnical display depicting the "Battle of the Argonne."

ROUNDUP STAGE COACH FOR ASTORIA MEETING.

The committee on arrangements for the state convention of the American Legion, department of Oregon, was more than pleased when news was received from Pendleton Post that the post in the round-up city would be represented in the convention parade with a big delegation and one of the round-up stage coaches. The dates of the convention which is to be held in Astoria are July 30, 31 and August 1st. The parade which is to be one of the big attractions will be held Saturday afternoon, July 31st. Invitations are being sent out to all posts in the state to be represented in what is expected to be the biggest ex-service men's parade since the cessation of hostilities. Prizes are to be offered for the best float or other representation and for the largest number of members any post has in line, in proportion to its membership.
