

IMPROVED STEAM AUTO HAS GAS ADVANTAGES.

The popular opinion has been that the gasoline auto is the standard because of its superior flexibility. To retain this feature, and achieve all that the steam drive for autos, new steam drive for autos, according to a new article in the July Popular Mechanics Magazine, with this improved equipment declared that steam may be run from a cold boiler in 20 to 50 seconds by merely turning a switch, the car will run a mile after the fire is shut off, and that one gallon tank of water is good for 250 miles. OREGON AFFAIRS TERSELY TOLD

Portland—Much after the fashion of collecting maple sap, the Northwest Turpentine company has been gathering pitch from fir stands in this section and has begun production of turpentine and rosin. Leases have been secured on certain tracts of timber, providing that all holes bored in trees shall be plugged up when the pitch has been removed. After securing the turpentine by distilling, it has been found that a small amount of balsam could be obtained from old growth yellow fir.

Portland—Logs from many coast sections of the state are to go over the great log booming plant being completed on the Willamette slough. Terminals and dumps, the largest on any rivers in the Northwest, are being installed at a cost of \$250,000. The first timber to go through is that being cut in hot virgin country on the Nehalem. Tualatin watershed.

Portland—No longer will the housewife find herself forced to buy, when she entertains at tea, sugar wafers packed in tins that have come clear from the east. A local factory has just installed a big machine that actually molds the batter on engraved plates and bakes it in two minutes, finally icing the cookie. The machine was purchased in London.

Portland—Twenty British merchants, touring the department stores in the larger cities of the United States and Canada, paid Portland a visit Monday and were guests of the Chamber of Commerce.

Portland—Swiss goats imported from Toggenberg are now supplying the northwest with the material for the Swiss cheese from Portland. The Clatsop county, which has just been

herd, which recently arrived, is to be made perfectly at home, for it is to have a Swiss keeper. The Hazelwood creamery has brought the animals here and placed them on a ranch at Lakeside. An investment of \$15,000 is represented by the new arrangements for the making of Swiss cheese.

Terrebonne—What old settlers thought was chalk and what sugar refiners knew to be diatomaceous earth is being taken from the Western Diatomite company's mine at Lower Bridge in such quantities that warehouses here are unable to accommodate it and erection of a new one is to be begun within a few days. Diatomite is valued as a paint and rubber filler and as an insulating material.

Astoria—Pulp wood is probably to come soon from the former holdings of the Hammond Lumber company in the Clatsop county, which has just been

purchased by the Crown-Willamette Paper company. The price is known to range between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000.

Astoria—Logging operations involving expenditure of over \$1,500,000 in the development of a tract of 600,000,000 feet of timber in Clatsop county have started by the Saddle Mountain Logging company.

Salem—Spinach to tempt the palate of the Upper Mississippi valley dweller is to be the first of the spring run to go out of the King's Products plant here. The company is preparing to handle \$2,000,000 worth of hydrated fruits and vegetables this season. The company is reorganizing and is being financed by local people. If sufficient stock is sold construction will begin on a new cold storage plant badly needed here.

Eugene—Excelsior made from balm wood is now being cut extensively for

a local manufacturing plant, which has 128 men in the woods at the present time.

Bend—Grangers from all over Oregon found themselves eating off of peculiar plates at an outdoor banquet given them here during their convention. One of the local mills had supplied thin strips of white pine for the purpose, while another cut up other slabs into clever menu boards.

Portland—Western red cedar shingles from Oregon are shipped to every state in the union, a report prepared by the district forester shows. California is the heaviest buyer. About eight per cent of the total amount of the product goes to the southern states.

Grants Pass—To effect a greater saving in gold being taken from Bridge creek in Josephine county, an electrically operated gold saving machine is to be installed.
