TEACHERS' EXAMINATION

The regular teachers' examination will be held at Dalas, Oregon, in the court house, on June 30th, July 1st, 2nd and 3rd, 1920.

For the convenience of the students and teachers who attend the Normal school during the summer, an examination also will be held at the high school building in Monmouth at the same time.

Program as follows: Commencing Wednesday, June 30th, 1920, at 9 o'clock A. M., and continuing until Saturday, July 3rd, 1920.

Wednesday forenoon—U. S. history, writing (penmanship) music, drawing.

Wednesday afternoon—Physiology, reading, manual training, composition, domestic science, methods in reading, course of study for drawing, methods in arithmetic.

Thursday forenoon—arithmetic, history of education, psychology, methods in geography, mechanical drawing, domestic art, course of study for domestic art.

Thursday afternoon—grammar, stenography, American literature, physics, typewriting, methods in language, thesis for primary certificate.

Friday forenoon—Theory and practice, orthography (spelling) physical geography, English literature, chemistry.

Friday afternoon—School law, geology, algebra, civil government.

Saturday forenoon—Geometry, botany.

Saturday afternoon—General history, book-keeping.
