EDUCATION HELPS FARMER BETTER FARM CONDITIONS.

"If better education leads only to higher earnings (it does that now, I believe) our rural problem will not be solved," says H. D. Scudder, head of farm management at O. A. C.

high earnings and brings no improvement in the standard of living it is bound to fail of its finest purpose," Professor Scudder declares. "The steadily declining rural population

is one of our greatest national perils.

"Volumes have been written to account for this growing danger to our economic balance, but its reasons may all be summed up as the less desirable living conditions on the average farm.

"Certainly many young men desert the farm and flock to the cities in hope of bettering their conditions."

Better education, Professor Scudder thinks, plays its greatest part in bringing the comforts of the city dwelling to the farm. This is indicated in a summary from the survey records of 825 farms visited by the Wisconsin experiment station: (the first

number of the following groups applies to 478 farmers with common school education only and the last number to 84 college trained men.)

Labor income—\$632, \$1056; value of house—\$1764, \$2558; bath equipment—22 per cent, 48 per cent; lighting system—17 per cent, 44 per cent; furnace heat—22 per cent, 47 per cent; automobile—20 per cent, 29 per cent.

Portland—Japan gets its first cargo from an Oregon port when the steamer, Vancouver Maru, which sailed last week, arrived on the other side of the Pacific. The boat is also carrying a quantity of steel and lumber.

OREGON SETS PACE FOR OTHER BIG DAIRY STATES.

"Oregon sets the pace for other big dairy states," says a recent issue of The Butter, Cheese and Egg Journal, Milwaukee, Wis.

"The Oregon Agricultural college was, we believe, the originator of placing on every pound of roll of butter an insert printed on parchment paper, giving food values, vitamins, analyses and statements from prominent dietitians.

"Printed on the wrapper, we believe these statements would not relieve much, if any, consideration from the busy housewife, but where she is compelled to pick off this little piece of paper, she naturally will glance at it and when the next week she gets another with a different message, she will undoubtedly, as Prof. V. D. Chappel states, begin to look forward to these weekly messages.

"Believing that the idea was a good one, we had a series of twelve inserts made up and several creamery men have ordered enough of them so that they can place one in or on every pound print, using the same message for the week, the series thus covering a period of twelve weeks.

"Every pound of butter therefore carries a convincing reason why butter should be used in place of so-called substitutes and as the cost is exceedingly small, a fraction of a mill per pound, we consider it most effective advertising. These inserts are 2 x 3 3/8 inches long and the following is a facsimile of one of them:

"As far as I am concerned I should never give my children any substitute for butter. Butter contains a vital principal necessary to the growth of children which none of its substitutes possess."—Dr. Wiley, in answer to an inquiry submitted to the "Good Housekeeping" magazine.

WORDS OF COMMENDATION FOR STATE UNIVERSITY

University of Oregon, Eugene—Captain John Kearney, U. S. army, retired, calls the University of Oregon the "rightest, tightest little school in the world."

HIS VAST WEALTH A CURSE

Sudden Possession of Immense Riches Too Much for Mental Stability of Mexican Indian.

Confined in an asylum for the insane in Mexico is a millionaire who never enjoyed a cent of his fortune, though for a time he had it in his possession in cash. The amazing story of this man to whom wealth proved a curse, is told by G. F. Weeks in the Wide World Magazine.

Juvenio Robles, a full-blooded Mexican Indian, was born in a palm leaf hut in the little town of Panuco, inland from Tampico. From earliest childhood he was forced to work, his wages amounting to less than 50 cents a week. When arrived at manhood he married and from then on turned his earnings over to his wife as banker. For several years he led a colorless existence, scrimping along day by day and saving little. Then one day some friends inveigled him into a card game. Fortune was with him and he won what was a great sum to them, \$18. This he invested in a small butcher shop. The market thrived and a few years later he was able to buy some land on which to fatten cattle. When oil was discovered at Tampico his ranch was in the heart of the field. He was offered 1,000,000 pesos and yearly royalties for the oil rights on his land. This he accepted, but demanded payment in gold.

The money was delivered to him as he requested, and from then on his sole interest in life consisted in guarding his treasure. He slept on a box filled with coins and refused to eat for fear his family would poison him. At last his mania reached such a stage that it was necessary to have him confined.
