- Doughnuts: 3 tablespoons shortening, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 cups flour, 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder. Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; stir in milk; add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder which have been sifted together and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick; cut out. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 60 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Afternoon Tea Doughnuts: 2 eggs, 4 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg.

- Crullers: 4 tablespoons shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 3 cups flour, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder, 1/2 cup milk. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beat eggs together; add flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add milk half and mix well; add milk remainder of dry ingredients; make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4 inch thick and cut into strips about 4 inches long and 1/4 inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.
