POWELL IS JERSEY BREEDER AT MONMOUTH

The Oregon Grower in its July issue printed a fine half tone cut of Perry O. Powell of Monmouth, republican nominee for representative from Polk county, and says:

"Mr. Powell, in addition to being a member of the Oregon Grower Co-operative association, holds membership in the following co-operative enterprises: Farmers' Union; Polk County Farm Bureau; Oregon Dairy-men's League; Monmouth Co-operative Creamery. He spent eight years as master of Monmouth Grange and for the past six years as master of the Polk County Pomona Grange, which position he still holds. He is also president of the Polk County Fair Association and the Polk County Farm Bureau. For three years Mr. Powell managed the Monmouth Co-operative Creamery and served as mayor of Monmouth for two terms. Mr. Powell is a big, husky, clean cut native Oregonian, having been born on a farm near Albany. He was educated at Monmouth, Transylvania college and Yale university. He has taught both in high school and college in the east, and seven years at the Oregon Normal school. Mr. Powell operates his own farm, specializes in pure-bred Jerseys and fruit."
