MUSHROOMS OF ALL SORTS
Edible and Poisonous, While One Species, Grown in Africa, Is Worshipped as a God.

In or about the edges of woods one occasionally comes across an unpleasant-looking umbrella-shaped mushroom with a red or orange-colored top that is covered with a slimy exudation. Now and then, strange to say, people eat it. They die.

Its slime is very attractive to flies. They gather upon it, and they die. In Europe this species of mushroom is used as a substitute for fly-paper.

The horrible-smelling "clathrus" mushroom is believed in France to cause cancer. French people call it the "cancer mushroom." Another species, which grows on olive trees, is so luminous at night that one can see to read by it.

Other kinds of mushrooms are used for making ink, for stanching the flow of blood and (in Lapland) for killing bedbugs. A European species is employed to stupefy bees, and certain "puffballs" are said to have anesthetic properties. Tribes of semi-savages in northeastern Asia utilize a mushroom for snuff. But most curious of all is the Polyporus sacer, which in Africa is worshipped as a god.—Pittsburgh Dispatch.

Valuable Shrub.

One may look for an increased cultivation of the so-called Guatemalan "jocote maraño" (anacardium occidentale), which is quite common in that country. It has been found that incisions in the trunk cause it to exude a resinous secretion that dissolves like gum arabic, and that is highly useful for pasting purposes. Used in the binding of books, it possesses, beside its adhesive qualities, the added virtue of keeping away moths, because of its acid odor. There is also obtained from the same plant, a caustic oil, which turns black when it strikes the air. This has been found excellent in the treatment of furniture. The seeds of the fruit are toasted and eaten, as well as used for various dishes. An 18 per cent extract of oil is made, which is said by connoisseurs to merit comparison with the best of sweet almonds. According to the newspaper Excelsior of Guatemala the cultivation of the shrub provides a business of increasing profitability.

Soot as a Disinfectant.

It has been found that soot acts as a disinfectant and is more active moist than dry. Water seems to dissolve the disinfecting agents in the soot, making them more active. Carbon floating in the air seldom, if ever, carries bacteria unless it has lodged on the ground and is again blown into the air.

Now soot acts as a very effective blanket, protecting the bacteria and giving them a chance to grow. Diseases of the nose and throat are not appreciably more prevalent in smoky cities, but they are more severe and harder to cure. This is probably due as much to the cracking of the mucous membrane by the change from the dry atmosphere in the houses to the moist air outside and subsequent irritation by dust and smoke.

America's Debt to Eads.

In nearly four centuries the names of many men have become linked historically with the "Big Muddy." De Soto discovered it, Marquette, LaSalle and Hennepin were among its explorers. Mark Twain was its Homer. But James Buchanan Eads saddled it and curbed it to serve mankind. His record is unique in the engineering annals of America, with the mighty river submissive in his power. He was the first to pry into its depths, to sound its secrets, wrest from it its hidden treasures; the first to build for it the first ironclads in the western hemisphere, to have swung a great bridge across it midway its length and, as the greatest achievement of all, to have compressed its channel at the mouth so that it cut a ship's way to the sea.

IMPROVEMENT IN CROPS
ACCORDING TO JULY REPORT

An improved condition since June 1 of all Oregon crops except fruit is a feature of the July crop report just issued by F. L. Kent, field agent U. S. bureau of crop estimates. This generally improved condition is due largely to favorable June weather. A precipitation of close of three inches fell over western Oregon with general rainfall of less amount over other parts of the state. While temperatures were below normal during part of June, were very favorable.

growing conditions on the whole since June 1, 3.0 per cent indicating a state crop of about 15,000,000 bushels. Harvest will be about two weeks late this season, beginning on the lighter lands probably about July 15. On the heavy lands of the principal wheat counties there are many fields where the stand is thin and many weeds are present. The thinner soils in southern Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam counties have the best crop in many years.

The U. S. crop also made improvement in condition during June, and is now estimated at 518,245,000 bushels.

Spring wheat—For three years past June weather has caused a marked decline in the condition of spring wheat. This year condition improved during June and the crop now gives promise of 4,500,000 bushels or more. In the western part of the state condition is generally reported as being close to the 100 per cent mark.

Improvement in the U. S. crop is indicated to the extent of about 14,000,000 bushels, the forecast being a production of 291,000,000 bushels for the 1920 harvest.

Oats—Oats which for the most part are spring sown, were greatly benefited by the June rains. An improvement of 5.0 per cent in condition is reported, which indicates a total production of probably 13,250,000 bushels. A considerable acreage of oats is always cut for hay and this hay harvest is now (July 10) well under way in western Oregon.

Some improvement took place in the U. S. crop, which is now estimated at 1,322,065,000 bushels.

Corn—Each year there is planted in the state an increased acreage of corn most of which is used for silo filling. The increase this year over last is reported as 3.0 per cent. Except for the past few days, temperatures have not been favorable for corn and the stand is thin in many fields.

The U. S. corn crop is estimated at 2,778,903,000 bushels, which is about 37,000,000 bushels less than the estimate of a year ago.

acreage appears to be about 96 per cent of the 1919 acreage. The condition of the crop is reported as 98 per cent of normal, which should make up for the deficiency in acreage, thus making the state's crop about the same as a year ago. A similar condition applies to the U. S. estimates. The total acreage appears to be about 96.0 per cent of last year, but condition of the crop is such that an increase of about 30,000,000 bushels over the final 1919 estimates is indicated.

Fruit crop prospects are for the most part greatly under the production of a year ago. Apples will probably be about 65 per cent of a year ago, the commercial crop of the state being estimated at about 60 per cent of last year.

Pears are also light this year, apparently not more than 60 or 65 per cent of a year ago.

Cherries are almost a failure in some commercial districts and will probably be less than 50 per cent of the 1919 production.

Prunes promise a crop not far from the production of a year ago.

Salem—The Salem Tile & Mercantile Company, which recently purchased additional equipment, now has a capacity of 60 tons a day and is operating to capacity.

Astoria—A log raft containing over 6,000,000 feet of timber has been sent out of the Columbia river by the Benson Timber Company, and is now on the high seas being towed to San Diego, where it will be sawed into lumber.
