MILLION AND A HALF FOR UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS

University of Oregon—Assurance of a construction program for the University of Oregon which will total a million and a half dollars within the next five years, was contained in the report of President P. L. Campbell to the board of regents of the University, who met in special session here Saturday. The report of the president showed plans for increasing the staff of the university, raising the salaries of present members of the faculty, and providing buildings and maintenance which will much more adequately care for students coming to the university. Two of the new buildings have already been started, and a third will start within a few weeks. A number of new instructors were appointed at the special session of the board, both to fill vacancies, and to fill new positions created to care for the student body, which has grown largely since material additions to the teaching force have been made. The passage of the higher education millage bill has made possible the election of several members of the university faculty who were named at the meeting of the board of regents. William G. Hale, for ten years on the faculty of the School of Law at the University of Illinois, was elect-

ed dean of the School of Law of the University of Oregon. W. C. Daltzell was elected associate professor in the School of Law.

L. S. Huff, Verne McDougle and C. M. Hogan were elected assistant professors in the School of Commerce, and John Whitecar and Franklin F. Folts instructors in the School of Commerce. New members of the faculty in the School of Education elected include Rollien Dickerson, assistant professor and principal of the model Junior High School, and Miss Thora Smith, instructor in the School of Education.

Three instructors in the School of Architecture were named: F. H. Miles, instructor in building construction; Miss Freda Storm and George H. Reed, instructor in mechanical plants. Miss Laura C. McAllister and Miss Mary E. McCornack were elected instructors in the women's gymnasium and Dr. Bertha Stuart Dymont was named medical consultant for women.

Two assistant professors in rhetoric, Miss Grace Edgington, and Andrew Fish, were elected. Miss Florence White and Miss Anna M. Thompson were elected instructors in Spanish, and Miss Madeleine Girardot instructor in French. Kimball Young was elected assistant professor of physics.

A number of graduate fellows and assistants were also elected. Rudolph Gjølness was elected head of the order department of the library of the university, and Miss Louise Davis, Miss Mary Platt and Miss Merle Hamilton were elected to assistantships in the library.

Dr. James H. Gilbert, who has been professor of economics in the department of economics and sociology, was elected head of the department of economics, which has been separated from the department of sociology.

Increases in salaries of members of the faculty totaling 25.9 per cent of the entire payroll were allowed. Individual increases ranged from less than this figure for some members of the staff recently elected to the faculty of the university, to somewhat greater than this figure for those who have been here for a number of years and for some, who on account of special ability, were promoted in rank.

Budgets were approved for the extension division and for the library of the School of Law. A special budget for the biological survey, to co-operate with a fund given by State Senator Robert A. Booth, was approved, at the special meeting of the board.

Plans for the financing of a new building for the School of Music and of a new men's dormitory were also approved. Under these plans the buildings will be constructed by a private corporation and leased to the university for a period of years, the buildings and the grounds on which they stand to become the property of the state at the expiration of the lease. The naming of the new buildings now under construction and those to be constructed was referred to the executive committee.

W. K. Newell, who recently resigned from the board of regents, was elected director of properties of the university. Mr. Newell's place on the board of regents has not yet been filled, but his position on the executive committee of the board was filled by the appointment by Judge J. W. Hamilton, president of the board, of Regent Vernon H. Vawter of Medford.

RIDDLE CASE REVERSED BY SUPREME COURT

The supreme court has reversed the decision of Judge Skipworth in the Riddle road case, holding that the highway commission has legal right to locate, construct and improve state highways which were not definitely and officially located as the Pacific Highway prior to the Act of 1917 or at any time thereafter.

The opinion was written by Justice Burnett, and says in part:

"The main contention on the part of the plaintiff and respondent, and the one upon which the court below rested its decision in plaintiff's favor, was that the highway commission had no authority to create or lay out a new road, but that this authority was vested exclusively in the county courts. Also that the highway commission could only designate or adopt roads which already were county roads and public highways as a part of the state system of roads."

"The act of 1917 provides for a general system of state highways, consisting of trunk roads along the main routes of travel and commerce with branch lines extending out into every portion of the state. It provides for a highway commission whose power, authority and duty are not confined to one person or thing or to any one county or place, but are general and extend to every hamlet and neighborhood in the state."

"The courts have found much difficulty sometimes, in close case, in distinguishing between general laws on the one hand, and local and special ones upon the other, but here the act is so broad in its scope, so general in its nature, that there is little if any room for questioning its character as a general law."

"It seems perfectly plain, from all of the various provisions that it was the intention of the legislature that the highway commission should have power to lay out, designate and improve roads where there had previously been no highways. Otherwise, why would there have been any provision for requiring rights of way, and why any provisions as to local changes, and why the distinction between state and county roads, and the provision for the definite location of roads by the state engineer?"

"If this were not the proper construction it would be impossible the commission to work out a complete system of connecting roads. The commission would be entirely at the mercy of the county courts and have to follow the roads as designated by the county courts, however faulty the grades and alignments might be. It would entirely paralyze the commission from taking advantage of any cutoffs or new routes, however, much better the route might be than the old one."

"We do not think that the Riddle was officially designated as the Pacific Highway to the act of 1917, or at any time thereafter. The agreement between the county court and Mr. Bennett there was such an agreement, not with the commission and was in any way binding upon that commission. The most that can be claimed is the evidence, it seems to us, that there is some room for question as to whether the location fixed by the commission was preferable to other route. The commission has discretion in deciding this question."
