ONLY LAND IS TO BE MADE SLUMLESS

New York—Neither stuffy tenements, dirty factories, narrow streets, crowded slums will be tolerated in Jerusalem and other urban centers of Palestine. "the Jewish Home-land" by the British high commission.

Anticipating a heavy influx of Jews back to the Holy Land, a city town planning commission has been appointed to regulate the distribution of population, and prevent mushroom growth spoiling forever the beauty of the ancient cities, according to information received by specialists here.

All town plans will have to be approved by the High Commissioner, Herbert Samuel. Civic commission, with full authority will control development in Jerusalem, Haifa and Tiberias, working plans approved by a central commission. This body may be headed by Sir Patrick Geddes of the University of Edinburgh, town-planner of Bombay and other cities of India. Homeowners have been advised to consult with the local commissioners before attempting new construction. Palestine is now half empty and there is ample room for new communities and modern quarters. In visiting them the poor must not be left in crowded settlements while the rich enjoy spacious houses and beautiful gardens, said the high commissioner in announcing his city planning ordinances.

"It is the duty of the government to supervise these things," he is quoted as saying. "We may hope to see here noble cities with parks and open spaces, designed, not in the foreign extraneous style, but breathing the spirit of the land, representing the best ideals of those who work its upbuilding."
