Six thousand gophers to his credit in four seasons, William H. Rue, 75 years of age, has recently closed a contract with county commissioner Richard Scott of Benton county and others to trap gophers on 3000 acres in that county. "Bill" says his best record was 1284 on a 31 acre tract of the Lucas ranch and his best day's catch was 71 gophers caught in traps. His average each season, during the time he traps, was 30 per day, which at 25 cents each makes his daily wages \$7.50.

## SILVERTON VOTES TO BOND FOR \$60,000

Silverton taxpayers are pretty evenly divided over the question of bonding the district for \$60,000 for a new school building. At an election last Saturday the affirmatives were in the majority by only two, and this makes the third time that the question has been submitted to the freeholders.

In the ballot box were found 10 affirmative votes which were marked wrong. Throwing these out entirely the bond issue would have been carried by a majority of 17. On account of the hot contest and close vote two counts were made and it was decided finally to include the votes which had been wrongly marked, but which were understood as 10 affirmative and 25 negative, leaving a majority of two votes in favor of the bond issue. This was the third election to decide the bond question. The first election was for \$60,000 bond and the issue was lost by a vote of nearly 2 to 1. The second election was called a few weeks later to vote on the question of bonding the district for \$15,000 and this was also lost. Before the last election a strong campaign was made to influence a favorable vote.

It is intimated that the election will be contested and in the event that such is the case the matter of building may be held up some time.

## INSECTS MAKE LEAVES 'WALK'

Queer Creatures Responsible for Odd Belief That Has Long Been Held in Australia.

There are some strange leaves in Australia which the people used to think could walk alone. Whenever there came a gust of wind these queer leaves blew off in a perfect shower. As leaves generally do, they turned over and over, and rested upon the ground. Then they would seem to crawl toward the trunk of the tree from which they fell. Since that time it has been found that these leaves, as they were thought to be, were real insects and lived upon those very trees. Their bodies are thin and flat and their wings veined, just like a leaf. If they are disturbed their legs, which are folded away under their bodies, leave their whole shape exactly like the leaf of a tree, with stem and all. Bright green in the summer, these singular little insects, chameleon-like, slowly change their color to a dingy brown, just like a leaf that has been frosted. It is strange that, with wings, they do not fly, but rather walk or crawl along the ground.

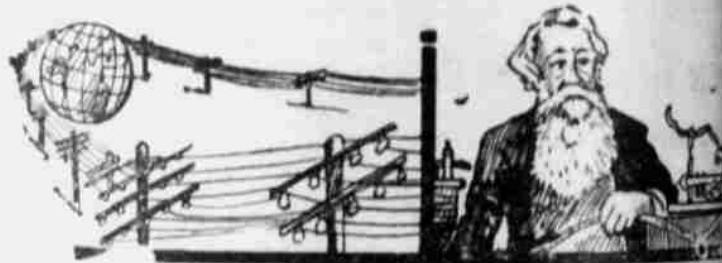
