MORE DELAY IN POLK ROAD CASE

Judge Kelley Rules That Separate Complaints Are Necessary

A decision by Judge Percy R. Kelly in the Polk highway case will result in additional delay in getting the matter finally adjudicated. The ruling is in no way on the merits of the case, simply sustaining the contention of the highway commission attorney that the amended complaint filed by Ernst Zielesch and other farmers residing south of town against the state highway commission, Polk county et al constitutes two alleged causes of suit not separately stated.

ROAD CASE DECISION IS SATISFACTORY TO WEUNS
