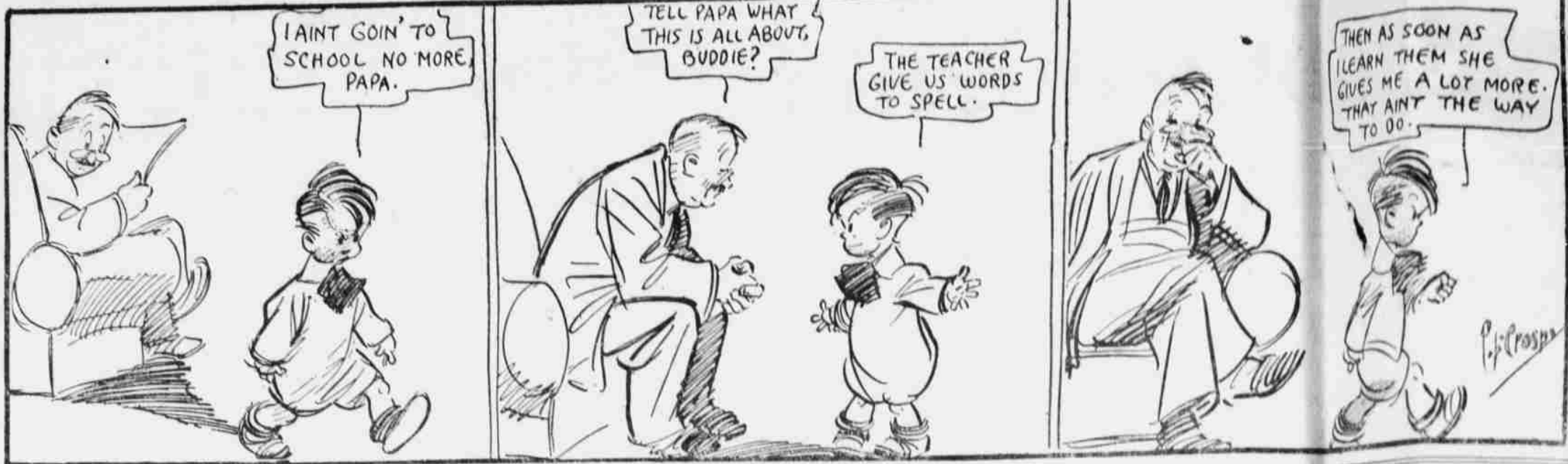

BOB-WHITE IS BIG AID TO THE FARMER

"When a man shoots a bob-white quail, or any other quail for that matter, he shoots one of the best friends he ever had. No indictment of bob-white as a destroyer of crops has ever been brought, or if it were, could it ever be made to hold? No bird or any other animal is more wholly a guard of the food supply of man.

At Clark university a captive bob-white ate in one day 100 chinch bugs, 12 squash bugs, 2326 plant lice, 39 grasshoppers, 12 cutworms, 12 army worms, 568 mosquitoes, 101 potato beetles and 8 white grubs.

Another bob-white on test devoured in one day 1350 flies, 5000 chryanthemum black flies, 1286 rose slugs, and 700 miscellaneous insects including 300 grasshoppers. These quail will eat 141 species of insects and 129 varieties of weed seeds. In a single day a bob-white has disposed of 105 seeds of stink weed, 400 seeds of pig weed, 5000 seeds of pigeon grass and 10,000 seeds of lamb's quarter.

A farmer who can succeed in homing on his farm a single family of quail throughout the year will add very perceptibly to his crop. Such a family consisting of two adult birds and ten young will, it is estimated, consume in one year 981,000 insects and 60,000,000 weed seeds, besides other food. They will eat daily one-half their own weight, and all their food is either waste material or actively hostile insects and weed seed.

It is estimated by agricultural authorities that a covey of quail is worth \$5 a head to any farm on which they remain for a year.—Portland Telegram.

Starting Clover Explained

Four common methods of starting clover were explained to Oregon farmers by G. R. Hyslop, chief of farm crops at O. A. C. experiment station. The surest way of getting a stand in western Oregon was said to be sowing in February on fall planted grain. This is adapted to soils in good tilth where clover grows successfully. Barley is the best nurse crop, wheat good, but oats undesirable. Light soils may be seeded on fall plowed lands, but the crop is often damaged by freezing. Sown with spring grain clover often fails. Inoculation is needed where no native clover or volunteer plants are growing. An application of 50 to 100 pounds land plaster per acre will help the plant through the dry season. Early winter pasturing is advised.
