

## TRAINING CAMPS FOR CITIZENS

Under National Defense Act Provision is Made for Training 1000

Summer camps for citizens of Oregon and Washington will be located at Camp Lewis, Wash., and at Fort Worden, Puget Sound, Wash. Camp Lewis will require about 960 students and Fort Worden about 40. At Camp Lewis, red, white and blue courses will be given for infantry, cavalry, field artillery, air service, engineers and signal corps, the camps opening July 27th and closing August 25, 1922. At Fort Worden, white and blue courses for coast artillery corps instruction will be given from July 27 to August 25, 1922. Citizens' military training camps are conducted by the war department under the national

defense act. The object of these camps is to bring together young men of high type from all sections of the country on a common basis of equality under the most favorable conditions of outdoor life; to stimulate and promote citizenship, patriotism and Americanism; and, through expert physical direction, athletic coaching and military training, to benefit the young men individually. The practical military training given at the citizens' military training camps will consist of a series of three courses, known as the red course, the white course and the blue course. The red course provides basic training limited to the simple fundamentals. In the infantry course are included the mechanism of close and extended order drills, ceremonies, preliminary instruction for target practice, rifle practice on target range, musketry and fire problems. The program of the red course for the cavalry, field artillery, engineers and signal corps will be confined in general to basic disciplinary and

practical training of the same elementary character as prescribed for the infantry red course, physical development, personal hygiene, care of equipment, discipline and morale will also be stressed. Age limits for the red course are from 17 to 25 years. The white course is intended to qualify students to become non-commissioned officers of the organized reserves. Students for this course will ordinarily be selected from enlisted members of the national guard, organized reserves, or qualified citizens who have had prior military service equivalent to the red course. Students will be instructed partly by actual performance of the duties of non-commissioned officers, and partly in schools of application established at the camps. Age limits for the white course are from 18 to 26 years. However, no student who successfully completed the red course in 1921 will be barred from the white course in 1922 on account of age. The blue course provides more advanced training for warrant officers and selected non-commissioned officers of the regular army, national guard and organized reserves, and for qualified civilians, with a view to their appointment as officers of the organized reserves. This course includes specialized instruction in branch of service, selected by the candidate and for which he is considered qualified by reason of previous experience and education. All candidates for this course must have completed the training prescribed for the Red Course and the White Course or the equivalent thereof. Age limits are nineteen to twenty-seven years. Applicants who have had prior military training in any of the three components of the army of the United States, especially veterans of the World's war, may be accepted for any of the three courses if not over 35 years of age. Physically fit male citizens between the ages indicated for the various courses are eligible to attend these camps, provided they are of average intelligence and good moral character. No particular educational qualifications are required, except that applicants for the white course must have a grammar school education or its equivalent, and applicants for the blue course must have a high school education or its equivalent. Almost any average young man can meet the physical requirements for the red course. He must have not less than two inches chest expansion and weight not less than one hundred pounds stripped. The heart, eyes and ears must be good, and the teeth serviceable. The minimum physical requirements for the white and blue courses applicants are practically the same as for the red, but slightly higher. A certificate as to moral character, given by a schoolmaster, clergyman, priest, rabbi, officer or ex-officer of the U. S. army, navy, marine corps or reserve corps will be required. The application blank will contain space for a physical examination. This examination must be undergone and the blank filled out before forwarding the application. The physical examination will be made without charge by any of the following: army surgeons, medical officers of navy or marine corps, recruiting stations, medical officers of naval training stations or naval operating bases, medical officers in charge of marine hospitals, U. S. P. H. S. stations or U. S. veterans' hospitals. The examination may be made by a civilian physician, the applicant must bear the expense thereof. Regular army, navy, marine corps and U. S. P. H. S. physicians will require no more formality than the presentation of the application blank. No applicant will be admitted to any camp unless he has taken the required vaccination against small-pox and the regular anti-typhoid-paratyphoid prophylaxis prior to his arrival thereat. Graduates of the 1921 citizens' military training camps are not required to take the prophylaxis again. Applicants who did not attend the training camps last year but who hold certificates showing that they have taken the anti-typhoid paratyphoid prophylaxis and have been recently vaccinated against small-pox should forward such certificates with their applications. No applicant should be vaccinated or inoculated with a view to attending the 1922 camp until he has been notified by the chief of staff of the division in whose area he resides that he has been tentatively accepted for admission to a camp. With such notification of acceptance, will be sent specific instructions as to how the vaccination and inoculation may be accomplished. In most cases this can be accomplished without expense to the applicant. All bedding, uniform clothing and equipment of all kinds will be provided by the war department. It is suggested that candidates bring such musical instruments, athletic uniforms and equipment, bathing suits,

etc., as they may desire, since the use of such articles will be encouraged at the camps. After an applicant has been notified of his acceptance and has been vaccinated and inoculated, definite instructions relative to his travel to camp will be sent him by the Chief of Staff of the divisional area in which he resides. Candidates from the regular army attending the camps, will be provided with transportation under the provisions of paragraph 27, special regulations 44-b. Transportation to camp and return for all other candidates will be provided as follows: (a) Applicants who are able to, may pay their own way to the camp and be reimbursed after their arrival there at the rate of five cents per mile, computed over the shortest usually travelled route from his home to the camp; or, (b) If this is not convenient, the government will furnish railroad tickets and, in addition, the candidates will be reimbursed for the actual cost of meals for the time actually and necessarily consumed in travel, but not to exceed \$3 per day. In this event, receipts for all expenditures for meals must be presented to the camp authorities by the applicants. It is strongly recommended that the applicants pay their own way to camp if possible to do so. They will find this the more convenient method. Shortly after arrival at camp, they will be reimbursed for the journey thereto at the rate noted in above. This amount will then be available for their personal use while in at-

tendance at camp. If the students upon leaving camp elect to take mileage for their return trip instead of being furnished railroad tickets and allowances for meals, such mileage will be paid them before they leave camp. At each camp there will be a post exchange (retail store), mail service and moving picture shows. In addition, there will be musical entertainments and athletic competitions participated in by the students personally. Each camp will have a surgeon, a chaplain, a morale and recreation officer, and an athletic officer, whose duties will be to look after the health and moral surroundings of the students. Opportunities will be offered all to attend religious services of their particular creed. The food will be of substantial quality, well cooked and plentiful. The uniform clothing provided will be suitable to the climate. The officers and noncommissioned officers on duty at the camps as instructors or staff-officers will gladly assist in every way possible. Every effort will be made by the camp personnel to make the stay of the students both pleasant and profitable and to send them home better qualified morally, mentally and physically to meet the responsibilities of citizenship.
