### DAYS NAMED FOR TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Dallas—The Polk County Teachers' Institute will be held at the Dallas high school in Dallas on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, November 1, 2 and 3.

Many prominent speakers will attend, one of whom is Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill, of Salem, who will give one general assembly address, and in section meetings will explain the revised course of study and also interest the teachers in teaching Oregon history and agriculture. Frank Brumbaugh, head of the department of psychology of the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis, will speak upon the following subjects: "Political Principles Employed in School Life," "Motivation," "Art and Knowledge in Examination," "How to Teach Reasoning." Ira Richardson from the University of Oregon, will give talks upon the following: "Some Professional Facts and Their Implications," "Unsolved Problems in Education," "What Is the Next Step in Secondary Education?" and "A New Day for Rural Schools." Mrs. W. A. Barnum, from the Oregon Normal school, will have charge of the advanced department in the division, Miss Kate Houx of the same institution of learning, will have charge of the intermediate department in the grade school, while Miss Clayton Burrow will have charge of the primary department on the grade division. Mrs. F. M. Parrish will be in charge of the music department and will present several interesting lessons as well as entertaining the teachers with her music. Miss L. Hazel Williams, the Palmer penman expert of Oregon, will present penmanship at the institute.

Josiah Wills, county superintendent of Dallas schools, as chairman; Mrs. J. H. Collins, Independence; E. K. Barnes, Grand Ronde; Miss Ruth Richards, Rickreall; J. W. Kauffman, Falls City. On the athletic committee has been appointed L. L. Gooding, Monmouth, chairman; P. W. Campbell, Falls City; O. D. Byers, Independence; J. C. Riney, Dallas; Wiley W. Knighton, Perrydale; Charlotte Davenport, Ballston and F. M. Mitchell, Rickreall.

During the time of the annual institute every school in the county must be closed and every teacher must attend the institute at least 16 hours.

The teachers of Dallas will give a reception to the teachers of Polk county at the Dallas high school on Wednesday evening, November 1, at 8 o'clock. Every teacher is cordially invited to attend this reception.—Observer.

The little bride-to-be, the most attractive and talented actress I could find for the role on Vella Lavella, is standing in the doorway of her father's house, as she would stand if she were actually being married, Edward A. Salisbury writes in Asia Magazine. The husband is selected according to the number of pigs and the amount of shell money he can pay for the girl; she goes to the highest bidder without having a word to say in the matter. The father, by touching the presents, signifies that he has accepted them. The marriage ceremony is then over. The one missionary on the island has naturally opposed this practice of selling brides. The natives were quick to learn this, and flocked to the mission station to marry the mission girls, because they did not have to pay for them. But the fathers of these girls created a lively disturbance because they felt that they were being cheated out of the customary presents. Finally the missionary was forced to compromise. He permitted the father to receive presents, provided the daughter was married in church. Then he would tell the groom that he was now a mission man and must live at the mission and work at gathering copra.

### BLIND MEN AND BIG TREES

Writer Laments That So Few Really See the Beauty of the Wonderful Redwoods.

On a page of his book, "The Open Spaces," John C. Van Dyke writes:

"After a week a sense of the bigness of the redwoods begins to dawn upon one. And their arrowy majesty and mighty lift are more comprehensible. How straight and strong and splendid they are!

"People, with a genius for seeing the infinitely little, camp under these great trees, and in the morning perhaps are amused by the antics of the Douglas squirrel (a western red squirrel) chattering himself around the 30-foot trunk; but they do not see the tree.

"They gaze beyond the 300-foot top into the sky, watching the wheel of a hawk or a vulture, but they do not see the sky.

"The story goes of some dullard presented to a great queen at one of her receptions and the only thing he saw about her majesty was the wart on her nose.

"But how can one miss the majesty of those mighty trees! They belong with the Grand canyon and Kanchanjunga—among the sublime wonders of the world."

### Two Sides of Body Don't Match.

The human body is not built symmetrically. One-half of the face is not exactly like the other half. If a line is drawn separating the two halves of the physique, well-marked differences may be noticed between them. The sculptors of Classic times recognized this anomaly, and represented it in their statues.

Venus of Milo, for example, has an asymmetrical face, that is, one in which proportions are not consistent. Most persons have heavier bones on the right side than the left. The two sides of the face vary. The eye sockets in both face and skull are of different size. The face usually seems to be shoved over toward the right side. The ears are usually of different size and differently modelled. The shoulders are not of the same height, and are removed varying distances from an imaginary dividing line drawn through the center of the body.

### Water-Drinking Habit.

"The habit of drinking water in moderate quantities between meals," says Health, "contributes to health, and indicates the fact that those who go abroad for the purpose of imbibing the waters of mineral springs might profit by staying at home and drinking more water and less whisky. Most likely it was a real apple that William Tell shot from the head of his son—if the shooting was done at all.
