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Bradstreet's Report.
Money to be Paid the Indians.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Secretary Hoke Smith requested the treasury department to pay \$600,000 due the Indians in Idaho for their lands sold a year ago. Payment was stopped two months ago on charges of frauds of various sorts. These have been proven unfounded. The tribe comprises 1,829 persons, each of whom will receive a little over \$2,000.

The Railroads Increasing Their Force.
OMAHA, Neb., July 11.—All Western railroads are again increasing their forces. During the panic the Milwaukee laid off 20 per cent of its employees, but now orders have been issued for an increase of its force in all departments. Nearly if not quite all of the old force will be at work soon and by August 1st possibly more than were formerly employed.

The Union Pacific is opening its Cheyenne shops and the Burlington is increasing its shop force at Holdrege. The Elkhorn is also reaping the benefits of better times and its force on sections and in shops is being increased. The Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha and the Missouri Pacific have also put additional men to work at various departments along their lines.

Sale of Seats Have Commenced.
DALLAS, Tex., July 11.—The sale of seats for the big fight began last night. Mr. J. T. Trezevant, president of the State Fair Association, was the first man served. He took five seats. The sales by wire and personal application have reached \$18,000.

From Vancouver Island to the States.
VICTORIA, B. C., July 11.—The report of the United States consul shows that the exports from Vancouver island alone to the United States for the year ending June 30 amounted to \$2,500,000. The value of coal imported amounted to \$1,900,000, while gold bullion is next with a total of \$325,000.

Harney County Products.
BURNS, Or., July 11.—It is estimated that fully 800,000 pounds of freight have been hauled to date to the merchants at this place. The wool clip has about all been mowed and runs up to fully 800,000 pounds for Harney county. Cattle of all classes, to the number of 3500 head, have been sold and driven out of the country up to date since last April. Instead of selling and shipping out mutton sheep, stockmen and ranchers are buying and driving in from outside counties. Very little grain and vegetables and no fruit will be raised in the valley this year. We have experienced most peculiar conditions unfavorable to crops in frosts, drouths and crickets.

One Gerdes Killed.
ASTORIA, Or., July 11.—Ione Gerdes the 2-year-old daughter of D. T. Gerdes, of this city, was run over and killed by a street-car this evening. The child started to cross the street just as the car was set in motion, and the driver was unable to avert the accident. The wheel of the car struck the little one at the hip and crushed the bones in a horrible manner. The driver, G. N. Miller, was placed under arrest, but no blame is attached to him by witnesses of the affair.
