Proposed New Paper.

The proposition for a second big paper in Portland has assumed a tangible form. Willis S. Thompson and Arthur Cooper, newspaper men of Denver, are the men at the head of it. They want 10,000 paid up daily subscribers at \$7.50 each. They agree to put in a four deck Hoe press printing three extra colors, the best press in the Northwest, and their telegraphic service is to be as good as that of the Examiner, Journal and American, indicating that to a certain extent they are being backed by Hearst. All parts of the state will be asked to assist. Certainly Oregon is big enough for two first-class dailies. Washington has two or three in Seattle, one or two in Tacoma, and one or two in Spokane, while Oregon has only one, the Oregonian. There should be two. When it comes, though, to making a guarantee of a certain number of subscribers it will probably not be done. The paper will have to start and build up its subscription, the same as other papers, by its merits, and if it gives such a service as the Examiner there will be no doubt in that direction.—Albany Democrat.
