Perrydale Flour Mill.

Special from Perrydale.

The farmers of this locality have on more than one occasion expressed a desire to see a flour mill erected at Perrydale, and now they are more than pleased to know that their desires are to be realized. The thoughts of an empty flour chest in mid-winter with no other recourse than to drive ten or fifteen miles to the nearest grist mill makes him hope for the success of the undertaking.

There is no question but that it is a natural place for such an enterprise, situated as it is in the heart of one of the best wheat growing sections in the Willamette valley and having no local competitors within a radius of ten miles.

The building of the mill has been under the supervision of H. T. Latham, the miller. It is well constructed and furnished throughout, and is now ready to be turned over to the millrights. The machinery arrived Friday and the work of installing it will be begun at once. This will require about
