The Quarterly of the Oregon Historical Society for March 1902, has been received. Its contents are as follows: "The Social Evolution of Oregon," by Prof. J. R. Robertson, of the chair of history, Pacific University, Forest Grove; "Political History of Oregon from 1865 to 1876," by Hon. W. D. Fenton, Portland; "History of the Barlow Road," by Miss Mary S. Barlow, a grand-daughter of Samuel Kimbrough Barlow, the builder; "Across the Continent Seventy Years Ago," compiled from the papers of John Ball by his daughter, Mrs. Kate N. B. Powers. John Ball taught a school at Vancouver in November, 1882, and was the first school teacher on the Pacific coast. All these articles are vitally important as relative to the history of Oregon.
