Chamberlain Walks Away With County by 130 Votes.

Monday was election day, and the problem has been partially solved such general scratching of ballots finds hardly a parallel in the history of the county. From a usual safe republican majority of 50 Independence turns to a majority of 31 for the democratic nominee for governor. Aside from the stateand congressional ticket little attention was paid to political affiliation by the voter.
