#### The Convict Who Distinguished Himself at the Pen.

Brave Frank Inghram, the convict who received a wound which cost him his leg by standing between dagger and a guard at the penitentiary at the outbreak a week ago, is getting along nicely, and his recovery is now assured. Governor Geer stated that he proposes to reward Inghram by granting him a full pardon, as soon as his condition will permit. The convict is almost sure to be allowed to walk forth from prison a free man.

Inghram was received at the penitentiary about 10 years ago from Linn county, having been convicted, after two trials, of killing his brother. Inghram pleaded self-defense. Since his incarceration he has been a model prisoner. The killing of his brother was the result of a family quarrel, and indirectly resulted from the division of the Inghram donation land claim upon the death of the parents. In the division of the property, Frank, being the favored son of his mother, was willed one-half of the farm home, while the other children were given the remainder of the farm and a small money consideration.
