**Old Landmark Gone.**

Special from Buena Vista. Twenty-eight years ago there was a protracted meeting held in Buena Vista. There was keen interest manifested and the conversions were numerous. On the spur of the moment a subscription paper was put in circulation asking for funds to erect a new church where all might assemble to worship and keep up the spirit that was abroad in the community as a result of the meeting. The responses were so generous that in a short time there was begun the erection of a church in the west part of town. While it was called Methodist, its doors were ever open for the use of any and all denominations when unoccupied by its founders.

The building stood in its shady lot when Buena Vista was a thriving town; when business enterprises sought other centers of commerce and left Buena Vista to decay, the old church stood, its spire ever pointing skyward like a hand lifted to guide and to warn.

In by-gone years there floated from the open doorway the voices of youths and maidens now grown to mature middle age; there were sounds of joy and glad some refrain in the holiday seasons; and again there came through the open windows the solemn funeral dirge, as dust was consigned to dust. In days of old there were voices in

the choir and in the congregation that are hushed forever in death; forms came and went that now sleep in the silent city on the slope, or have gone to rest in other lands. Thus, as the scene of festivity or of sorrow, the old church was sacred to many, and known as an old landmark far and near.

But the old site is vacant and the Methodist church has found a new location. The site chosen is the lots formerly occupied by the old pottery shops. The work of removal was successfully accomplished this week by Mr. Wilson, of Independence.

But though the old edifice stands on less sacred ground than its former site, the memories of the past cluster about it, and it will remain to its old friends what it has ever been—a building to be cherished as long as a shingle or a board of it remains.
