Publicity and the Doctor.

The statement is made by Dr. Cyrus
Edison, health officer of New York, that
there are many reasons why reputable
physicians should advertise their business
in the daily newspapers. Besides the
benefits to the doctor himself—benefits to
which he is clearly entitled and of which
he is robbed by neglecting to advertise—
it is a great convenience to the public to
learn at first hand where to find a physi-
cian who makes a specialty of a particular
class of diseases. Dr. Edison is confident
that the ban on advertising will soon be
removed.

Dr. Edison, whose rank is of the high-
est, undoubtedly voices the sentiment of
the more enlightened and progressive
members of his profession when he in-
sists that old-fashioned prejudice should
be done away with and the medical faculty
should no longer be compelled to hide
their light under a bushel.

A great many physicians get a goodly
amount of advertising through the public
press, and free advertising at that. No
physician ever interposes objections to
having his name mentioned in the public
press in connection with any notable
surgical operations. In fact, many physi-
cians who look upon paid advertising with
something akin to holy horror are
delighted to get a little advertising gratis.

Dr. Edison is not the first great physi-
cian who has publicly advocated advertis-
ing. Dr. Darrin, well known on the Pa-
cific coast and all over the world, has
been advertising for thirty years.
