INDEPENDENCE, Or., Aug. 16, '02. At an adjourned meeting of the Indian war veterans of 1855 and 1856 held at Independence August 16, 1902, the following proceedings were had:

On motion of Major Jas. Bruce, of Benton county, Ben Hayden was chosen chairman.

On motion of James Hays, of Corvallis, J. R. Cooper, of Independence, was chosen secretary.

On motion of Major Bruce the secretary was instructed to communicate with all the county clerks within the state and ascertain the
