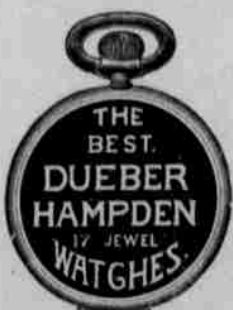
Pedee.
