MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Rev. Dr. Thompson Pays a Glowing Tribute to the Martyred President.

In conformity with the request of the president and governor, memorial services in memory of our martyred President McKinley were held in the Presbyterian church of this city last Sabbath evening. A large audience assembled to participate in these services which were deeply impressive. The music under the direction of Mrs. Babbitt was excellent and eminently appropriate. Dr. Thompson read a portion of scripture from that thrilling description of Christ's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane where He uttered those immortal words which were the dying utterance of our martyred president viz: "Not my will but God's will be done." Dr. Thompson then spoke briefly of the boyhood and manhood of McKinley and referred most fittingly to his pure noble life and character as a man, a soldier, statesman and a Christian.

He emphasized the one great element of the hero's character—his ardent and unflinching love and devotion to his home and the loved ones. Then he said McKinley was ever loyal and true to his country, his home and his God. He held up his pure and unblemished career as one worthy the example for all to follow.

The services closed by all uniting in singing the beautiful hymn so dear to the heart of McKinley—"Nearer my God to Thee."

NEW INSTRUCTOR.

Prof. L. A. Robinson Elected to the O. S. N. S. Faculty.

The chair of mathematics and physics was filled last Friday by the board of regents of the State Normal School at Monmouth in the election of L. A. Robinson, of the Washington State Agricultural College, at Pullman. Mr. Robinson is a graduate of the State Normal School of Nebraska and the State University of Illinois, holding the degrees of A. B. and A. M. from the latter. He has had 12 years' experience as teacher in public schools and colleges.

Mr. Robinson comes with splendid recommendations from President Bryan, of Pullman; State Superintendent Fowler, of Nebraska, and State Superintendent Sabin, of Iowa, in addition to others of value.

His thorough laboratory training in the university and experience as instructor in physics at Pullman will greatly strengthen the department of mathematics and physics in the State Normal School. He is a man of pleasing address

and has had unusual success in his class room work.

DIED.

IRVINE.—At his home in this city, on Monday, September 15, 1902, at 8:20 P. M., Josephus Duncan Irvine, of heart disease, aged 59 years, 8 months and 5 days.

Nothing could have been more unexpected than the above announcement made late Monday evening. Shortly before 8 o'clock he was on Main street, seemingly in the best of health. Going home he united in marriage two Indians, and while cheerfully conversing with them turned, fell and expired almost in an instant.

The funeral services occurred at the auditorium Wednesday at 1 o'clock P. M., being under the auspices of I. O. O. F. Lodge, of which Mr. Irvine was a long-time member. Dr. E. J. Thompson officiated as the minister and made the address. A large audience gathered to pay their tribute of high esteem to the memory of this most worthy friend and honored citizen. The entire exercises were deeply impressive and calmly comforting, though very sad and sorrowful. The music, under the direction of Mr. J. A. Mills, was eminently fitting and very sweetly and tenderly rendered. A large circle of the relatives of the deceased were present, among whom were the aged mother, who has passed her fourscore years, also a sister, Mrs. J. T. Ford, wife of Sheriff Ford, and two brothers, S. B. Irvine, of this city, and J. P. Irvine, of McMinnville, with their families. These with the bitterly bereaved widow and her two broken hearted sons gathered very closely together within the shadow of this most painful affliction.

J. D. Irvine was born in Gentry county, Missouri, January 10, 1843. In 1852 he came with his parents across the plains to Oregon, and settled in Marion county. There he grew to manhood and in 1870 married Miss Sarah Fisher, removing to this city in 1871, where he made his home till the day of his death. It will be noticed that
