### ATTEMPTED ROBBERY.

#### A Bad Man From Washington Tries to Rob the Imperial Saloon.

The hoppingkicking season draws all kinds of characters to Independence—good, bad and indifferent. A young man by the name of F. D. Weatherwax, from Rainier, Wash., proves himself not only to be bad but bold. Wednesday morning about 3:30 he climbed to the roof of a small building recently added to the Imperial saloon and from there he found an easy way to enter the Imperial saloon owned by Sam Wallace. He was in the saloon but a few minutes when Marshal Tupper appeared. Then things became lively. Weatherwax was given a pre-arranged signal by a boy confederate on the outside that there was danger so he made a bolt for the door leading to the side entrance of the saloon. By the time Weatherwax got into the alley the marshal was right behind him with a revolver in his hand. The fugitive was commanded to halt but he didn't halt worth a cent. The

sight of the gun only served to increase his speed. At the Main street end of the alley stood Oliver Smith, also armed. The speed of Weatherwax waxed hotter as his pursuers closed in. He shot past Smith at a two-minute clip and struck out in the direction of Salem. The marshal and Smith in the meantime kept shooting at the robber in a vain attempt to bring him to a standstill. Weatherwax kept right on and may still be going for aught any body knows.

Weatherwax had planned the robbery to take place the night before, but there was one thing he miscalculated and that was the secretiveness of the boy he took into his confidence to help him carry out his scheme. This boy weakened in his desire to become a bad man and notified the marshal of the contemplated robbery. Tupper laid his plans well and had it not been so dark would either have killed or landed his man.
