SUSIE FENNEL PIPES.

Former Independence Girl Winning Name for Herself.



A remarkably brilliant violinist, well known in Portland and also throughout the state, is Susie Fennell Pipes, who from an early age has displayed before critical music-lovers unmistakable evidences of talent. She first appeared in public at the age of 15 before the Philharmonic Society, playing a polonaise to A major, by Wieniaski, which awakened much interest in her career.

Mrs. Pipes was received with great enthusiasm at the Southern Oregon Chautauqua the past summer. Mrs. Pipes' musical studies have been directed under well-known artists. She was married to John M. Pipes, son of Judge Martin L. Pipes, when she removed to Washington, D. C. While in the East Mrs. Pipes had the advantage of training under some of the best music instructors in the country. Since her return West she has been a member of the Spitzner-Konrad Quartette and the Portland Symphony Orchestra. She was a pupil of Theodore Spitzner, of Chicago. Mrs. Pipes has been appointed violin instructor in the State University School of Music at Eugene. She is now planning a concert tour through Willamette valley cities.—Evening Telegram.
