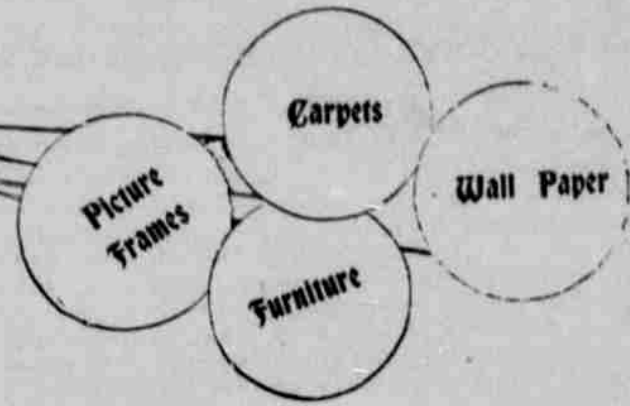
E. Davidson has finished sowing 20 acres of Musquit grass and C. E. Tedrow six acres of yetch seed.

For six weeks he battled bravely with that dreaded disease, typhoid fever and all that the best of medical skill and the most faithful loving care could bestow were given him, but all in vain. For Death claimed him for his victim.

At the age of 19, his brief life ended on earth, to begin its eternal existence in a better and brighter world beyond. He was a young man of excellent character; loyal to duty and to the right and a sincere lover of his home and his friends. It will be remembered that he was a member of the last

He was a member of the Degree of Honor and the members of this worthy Fraternity attended the funeral in a body. Over the hill yonder in the Odd Fellows cemetery he was laid to rest, where the very tears of heaven fall upon the beautiful flowers that cover his silent home.
