It is safer, less expensive and above all removes the demoralizing influence executions have on communities. By all means provide for this change.

We agree with Governor Chamberlain that the state is supporting too many Normal schools, and that two is sufficient for the state. There ought to be the one at Monmouth maintained, increased and improved by more liberal appropriations and then if there is another Eastern Oregon should be favored. The Monmouth Normal, by virtue of its unquestioned right to be classed as the leading Normal of the coast and one of the strong institutions of its kind in the United States, should be built up by every favor the state can bestow on it. Eastern Oregon is entitled to the other because that section is unrepresented by state institutions. The state university, always to be considered the leading state educational institution, is in easy reach of the southern part of the state. There is no more reason why the state should be asked to support several Normal schools than it should be called upon to maintain several agricultural colleges or state universities.
