River Several Miles Wide at This Point.

SOME LITTLE LOSS OF PROPERTY.

Steamer Eugene Anchored at the Rear of Frazer & Rice's Hardware Store.

A couple of days' warm rain was sufficient to melt the snow that feeds the upper Willamette, and seldom has so rapid a raise occurred in the history of the river. Monday it registered twenty-five feet above low water mark, and as the locks at Oregon City were closed and no boats this side of them, hence no river navigation on the upper Willamette. The steamer Eugene was anchored for two or three days at the rear of Frazer & Rice's hardware store, water being too high for work on the revetment to progress.

Some little property is reported lost. D. L. Hedges is said to have lost 43 head of sheep and others have suffered some loss with sheep, while it is reported a gentleman by the name of Buffum, across the river, lost a, span of horses. The loss in the logging industry should be quite noticeable.

The water is falling rapidly and will soon he at a good boating stage.
