The Logging Season.

Special from Buena Vista.

Probably not one person in a hundred realizes the magnitude of the logging industry in Oregon. Rapidly are the giant trees disappearing from our forests, slain to feed the hugh mills of our prosperous commonwealth; and paper and lumber made therefrom are shipped all over the world. Thousands of tons of paper leave the paper mills at Oregon City annually, bound for Australia, China, Japan and other foreign countries. And this is but one plant.

The logging season is the boating or high water season, which is now at hand. To many laborers it is the harvest of the year, for it affords employment while other work is at a standstill. Logging begins this week in the vicinity of Buena Vista, at the mouth of the Luckiamute. The steamer Gray Eagle will be placed in service on the task. There are 10,000,000 feet of logs to be rafted and the work is being done for the well known Spaulding Logging Co.

The rafts go to Newberg and Oregon City and, like the mountain brook that helps to swell the ocean, they are but a unit of the vast amount of logs that are rafted annually on Oregon's placid Willamette.

What and Where We Are.

Special from Buena Vista.

Many people within a few dozen miles of a town or village very often know but little concerning the place, people and locality in general. Readers of a paper frequently see notes from a town, without having the least idea where that town is situated. Therefore, this sketch may prove

of interest to many and give information that will be most acceptable to newcomers or Eastern readers:

Buena Vista is a little village on the Willamette river, seven miles south of the bustling town of Independence, about 12 miles north of Albany and only two and a half miles east of Parker station, which is on the main line of the S. P. railroad.

In Buena Vista there is an excellent graded school, a diploma from which entitles the holder to entrance into any of the various colleges of Oregon. There is a thoroughly up-to-date dry goods and grocery store where the highest market price is paid for all farm produce; another grocery and general merchandise store; a post-office; blacksmith shop; two churches; a genial class of citizens; an excellent climate, good water, beautiful and productive farms and a welcome for all homeseekers. There is a daily postal service, the mail being carried between Parker and Buena Vista at 12 M. and at 3 P. M. each day.

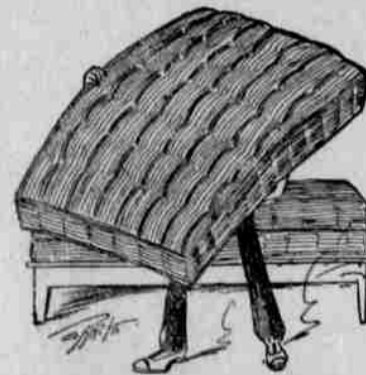
