J. W. Fetzer and wife went to Independence Thursday evening to attend the I. O. O. F. entertainment there and came home well pleased and report a fine time.

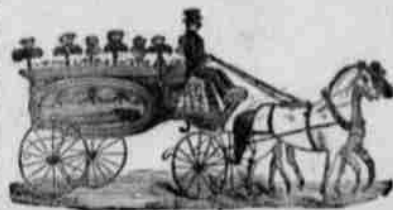
Joe Casteline sold his fine driving horse to a gentleman from McCoy for one hundred and thirty five dollars.
