HE WAS FOUND DYING IN HAY LOFT

Last Night the Community Was Startled By the Announcement

P. H. McCabe, proprietor of the Independence tile factory, was the victim of a fatal stroke of heart trouble Wednesday evening. He had just climbed into the hay loft, preparatory to shoving down some hay. When found he was unconscious and shortly after assistance arrived expired. It is supposed the extra exertion brought on the attack. When he failed to make his appearance at home his family were uneasy and telephones were sent to town. Later he was found as above narrated.

Mr. McCabe's health has not been the best the past year and just the other day stated to us he intended moving to a farm and spend the remainder of his days in quiet. He leaves a wife and son. Funeral arrangements have not been perfected at the time we go to press.

Death of Mrs. Belle Morin.

We received the following notice Tuesday.

"Died—At Eugene, Oregon, April 3, 1903, Mrs. Belle Morin, wife of J. B. Morin, aged 33 years, 9 months and 16 days. Funeral
