WINE OF CARDUI

uresque and mighty Columbia from the decks of the Potter is a treat never to be forgotten. For speed and grace nothing in river or lake service in the entire West equals this side-wheeled beauty. Five hours from Portland and one from Astoria, through the famous fishing waters of the Columbia, past score of salmon traps and nets and as many white-winged fish boats, lands the passengers at Ilwaco, where close connection is made for beach points with trains of the Ilwaco Railway & Navigation Company, whose cars stand on the wharf awaiting the steamer. The beach is twenty-seven miles long, two hundred yards wide at low tide, and so hard that carriage wheels scarcely leave a mark. The people living on the west side of the Willamette have been trying for some time to have the Southern Pacific Company put on a train service that would enable the folk along that bank of the river to come to Portland in the morning and return to their homes the same day.

The Journal recently published letters from interested parties at Independence and Corvallis, addressed to the local Board of Trade, urging that this train service be arranged for at once. It is said by those residing in the up-river towns that the railroad company will be able to build up its business from that section of the state to a very great extent if this service is placed in operation.

This morning, Secretary Max Shillock received the following letter from J. Kruttschnitt, general manager of the Southern Pacific:

San Francisco, June 3.—M. M. Shillock, Portland Board of Trade—Dear Sir: I have your letter of June 3, regarding improvement in the train service on the west side of our division in Oregon.
