A Live Polk County Village.

In these times of rapid changes from the old to the new order of things the public is not apt to be informed regarding the many changes that are continually taking place around them.

We believe such to be the case with the advent into this community of a new stove-making machine recently put in operation here by Ed Patras at an expense of about \$600. From any knowledge that we can gain we believe this to be the first machine of the kind set up in Polk county, if not in the state. Heretofore stove making has been carried on entirely by hand labor, by which means only a few hundred could be turned out in a day by two men with axes and a cross-cut saw. This slow and expensive process has now been relegated to the rear, as Mr. Patras with the new invention and nine assistants is turning out on an average of 5000 staves per day. Airtie being surrounded by one of the best belts of oak timber on the coast is evidence that success will attend Mr. Patras' venture on a larger scale.

During the five years that he has carried on stove making here he, at the end of this season, will have manufactured and shipped to market upwards of 475,000 staves.
