A Widespread Evil.

We are not a lecturer on moral reform; we do not aim to interfere with other people's affairs nor to dictate the rule of conduct to be pursued by wiser heads than ours. But ours is the privilege to express an idea on a custom that is in vogue, and we gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity to "speak up in meeting."

Much has been said and written concerning dog as man's best friend; much also is said and written concerning the horse, but on this topic too much stress cannot be laid. A horse, in point of intellect, in cleanliness of habits and in faithfulness to its master, ranks next to the better class of humanity. No animal is of such service to mankind; none is half so faithful and long-suffering, and none receives less for services rendered.

Only his feed and a shelter is the horse given, and too often the food is insufficient and the shelter little better than nothing, while blows and curses are the rule in handling the faithful brute.

But, it is the practice of allowing small children to drive and manage horses that excites our special indignation. Little boys who are scarcely old enough to be allowed to leave their mother's apron strings; lads in knee pants, with no proper conception or judgment regarding the endurance of a horse, are allowed to go and come with the faithful animal that is kept for family driving.

We are too prone to imagine that our Billy or Dickie or Jerry is better than other lads; that he will not be guilty of the misdemeanors known to us of our neighbor's son. But you watch Billy or Jerry when he lances himself safely beyond the parental eye;—the lash is laid and up hill, down hill, over cross walks and bridges goes the poor horse, to be jerked and beaten without provocation if he makes what his youthful driver considers a misstep or a stumble; to be raced and mistreated and finally cooled off before being driven sedately up to the barn door at home again.

Do you think the picture over drawn? It is not. Observation proves it true in country lane and city street. The remedy lies with the parents. Children need first of all to be taught the loveliness of thorough kindness to their inferiors and to dumb animals; secondly, until they are old enough to have common sense and good judgment they should not be allowed to handle man's patient and true friend—the horse.
