## Hop-picking Notes.

Hop-picking began at Messrs. Tedrow's and Ruef's yards Monday, August 31, and after a very successful two weeks' picking ended Tuesday, September 15th. The hops were in fine condition, presenting nice heavy clusters and not many leaves. Mould is hardly in evidence and lice are scarcely perceptible. Several thousand pounds of the very finest hops will reward the efforts of the industrious growers of these yards.

The pickers were paid by the pound, which method gave good satisfaction as the boxes weighed from forty-eight to eighty pounds, and the average in general was highly satisfactory. The managers of the yard were very kind and courteous toward the pickers, who in their turn expressed their appreciation by their efforts to faithfully do their part. And we are of the opinion that there will be no nicer, cleaner hops offered for sale from Polk county than those grown in the yards belonging to Tedrow and Ruef.

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Hop-picking began at Mr. Helmick's Monday, September 7th, and they expect to finish some time this week. We have not visited this yard yet, but report says the hops are fine, much better this year than usual.
