Assessment and Taxation Muddle.

The legislative assembly of 1903 attempted to enact a new tax law, one of the salient points of which is that taxes shall be paid in the fall instead of the spring. It also changes the time of levying the tax, and in the attempt to change the time for this particular duty of the county courts time for levying the tax for this year is cut out entirely. That this is a fact is the opinion of a number of lawyers in Portland who have looked the matter up. This serious difficulty must be remedied somehow, and it is contended by some that the only way out is to have an extra session of the legislature. Others think the supreme court will decide that the county courts may levy the tax at the time provided in the old law for this year, notwithstanding that law will be repealed before that time arrives. A test case is to be brought in Multnomah county at once to determine the stand the courts will take in the matter.

The law of 1901 upon the subject of the state tax is of questionable constitutionality. The defect in the law lies in the fact that the

method of assessing the state tax among the several counties is not equitable and uniform. The provisions of this law are that the state tax is apportioned among the several counties in proportion to the expenses of the individual counties and not on an assessment of the property in the counties. It is easily seen how an injustice might be worked against one or more counties each year to the advantage of all the others. The mandate of the constitution is that taxation shall be equal and uniform to all. Under either of these laws it is possible, some attorneys say, for a taxpayer to refuse to pay his tax, or even for a county to refuse to pay any state tax at all.
